

Sunday 2nd of July 1877.

Splendid weather, one in sight quite cool, so ends this day.

Monday 3rd of July.

Light wind and very warm, at noon had calm, bent the foretop sail, some grampasses in sight quite good weather, so ends this day.

Tuesday 4th of July.

Very warm, all sail out, light wind, plenty of finbacks in sight, so ends this day.

Wednesday 5th of July.

All day sawing sail, light wind, finbacks in sight, steering east by south so ends this day.

Thursday 6th of July.

Strong breeze, ship under short sail quite cool today, sawing sail and making changes so ends this day.

Friday 7th of July.

Light wind and quite cold heard the main Spencer so ends this day.

Saturday 8th of July.

Today heavy gail from the westward put ship under close reefed the topsails ran until four came six to the wind took all sails, heavy sea tonight, so ends this day.

Sunday 9th of July.

Heavy gail from the N. W. nothing but main Spencer out, very heavy sea, at daylight set the topsails close reefed at four sent main royal yard, very cold decks full of water, so ends this day.

Monday 10th of July.

Heavy gail, main Spencer out very heavy sea, quite cold, so ends this day.

Tuesday 11th of July 1877.

Very heavy gail stove the Boiv Boat, close reefed maintop sail, wind about West so ends this day.

Wednesday 12th of July.

Had quite good weather, two reefed on the topsails after dinner came on so blow hard put ship under short sail, at ten o'clock the first watch raised a sail so ends this day.

Thursday 13th of July.

At one o'clock last night good weather set foretop sail and foresail, light wind, at daylight sent down main de galley yard.

Friday 14th of July.

Chill and heavy weather, raised Saint Paul's shortem sail for the night, boats ready for Bay, whaling, so ends this day.

Saturday 15th of July.

Quite heavy gail last night took in foretop sail at daylight land close to about five miles off set foretop sail to get by it at four quite good weather so ends this day.

Sunday 16th of July.

This morning at daylight St Paul's in sight on the De. beam reef off for it sent the dist mast and Larbert Boat in for wright whaling but did not see any, the people there set their flag half mast, could not land, so much sea, they came down on the rocks and told us that they have nothing to eat, gave them some fish and bread, at sundown one sail in sight.

Monday 17th of July.

Strong breeze, went in the Land, but did not see anything, ship leaving 2000 shoals so ends this day.
