

Bark Pacific Cruising in the North

Friday July 21st. Comes in with light air and calm. Ship steering S. S. W. with all sail out. Water blue with Yellow Drops and Sord stools - nothing more indicating whales - 13th Chie in sight steering S. S. W. - In the A. M. saw two sails, men, chautmen steering to the N. E. in sight. Lat. 42.59 N. Long 30.30 W.

Saturday July 22^d Comes in with moderate breezes from the E. and fine weather - Ship steering S. W. per compass with all sail out cruising - water blue and thick with jellies and toud stools - several sails in sight steering to the N. E. - signalled an English ship at Sundown whose Long. was 32.00 W. - Saw several schools of Grampuses and three schools of porpoises - nothing more indicating whales in sight all day.

Lat. 42.34 Long 31.20

Sunday July 23^d Comes in with light winds from the E. and fine pleasant weather - Ship by the wind to the S and S. W. with all sail out - water blue with plenty of jellies and tall low Drops - saw two schools of Grampuses and one school of porpoises all going to the S. E. - saw through the day several sail merchant men all steering W. E. but one to the N. W. Lat. 41.34 N. Long 31.34

Monday July 24th Comes in with light winds from the E. and N. E. with pleasant weather - Ship steering South per compass with all sail out - water blue with jellies and Yellow Drops - Saw sail in sight both on the wind to the E. - Larro & Flores both in sight bearing S. Dist 20 miles at M. Lat 40.04 N. Long 48.09

Atlantic Ocean in Year of 1876

Tuesday July 25th 1876 Comes in with moderate breeze from the N. E. and quite fine weather, but somewhat cloudy - Ship all night in the channel between Larro and Flores - at daylight kept off for Flores - Star. Cruz - lying off and on were schooner oblonge Fisher 3 months from Providence with 350 Bbls. sperm oil & Brig. Gazelle of Sagal Capt. John Da Silva 2 mos. with 180 Bbls. sperm oil - both obtaining recruits - at 8 A. M. went on shore - Ship lying off and on - obtained 74 Bush. of Potatoes, 1 qr. Fresh Beef, 11 chickens & 2000 Onions & 2 doz. cabbage for which I paid Alonzo Molar 25 & Powder. The people wanted rakes but the weather was too rough to land them - all on board by 5 P. M. and kept ship off down S. side of the Island - at sunset Capt. Silva came on board for Powder and tobacco - sold him some of each - Strong breeze all day and very rough off the port.

Wednesday July 26th Comes in with fresh breezes from W. E. and cloudy with light squittings of rain - Ship steering W. S. W. & W per compass with all prudent sail out cruising - In the morning saw the Isle of Flores bearing N. E. by E. Dist. 20 miles - Saw also in the A. M. one school of Grampuses breaching - Nothing more in sight

Lat. 38.38 N. No Long.

Thursday July 27th Comes in with light winds from the E. N. E. and fine pleasant weather - Ship steering W. & W. B. N. per compass with all prudent sail out - water blue and clear - Nothing in sight all day.

Lat. 37.51 Long 33.38 W.
