

Bark Pacific Homebound Bained

Wednesday Nov. 1st. Comes in with light breeze from N.W. and smoky weather. Ship by the wind to the W.S.W. until 10 A.M. then to N.N.E. with all sail out. Nothing in sight all the A.M. Water blue with some pieces of Gulf weed and some three or four birds. Ship making slow progress. made another attempt to spade and scrape off Graft and clams from side of the ship. Lost Sunday at 12 M. we were by projection 242 miles from Gay Head. Today at M. we were 247 miles, thus making but 15 miles in three days or 5 miles per day.

Thursday Nov. 2d. Comes in with small winds from S.W. and hazy weather. Ship by the wind to the N & W with all sail out. In the A.M. started the works and hoisted the whale turning up a trifle over 12 o'clock. In the P.M. quite a fresh breeze from S.W. steering N.W. by W. Are in the Gulf Stream.

Lat. 36.31 Long 69.26

Friday Nov. 2d. Comes in with fresh breezes from S.W. and overcast. Ship steering N.N.W. with all sail out. One sail in sight steering to the E. by the wind. at 11 wind changed in a squall of rain to the N.W. blowing quite strong for a short time. In the P.M. quite moderate. Got out of the Gulf about 1 P.M. by the change of water being 58 while all the A.M. it was 76 at 4 P.M. took in cutting stage, took craft out of the boats &c &c and made preparations for going into the Port of New Bedford. Water Green at sunset.
