

Ship Pacific of New Bedford
Sunday July 5th 1843

First part of gale from north lying to under close reef main top sail and fore sail over cast weather latter more moderate all sail winched hauls to the westward pleasant weather saw 2 ships one under easy sail boiling so in

Lat 54 25 3 off
Long 147 49 W

Monday July 6th

First part light airs from westward pleasant weather at 2 P.M. saw whales lower struck and killed one S.B. took him along side set the water at 5 P.M. call all hands and commenced cutting blowing heavy from W.B. thick fog weather leave off cutting so ends whale along side.

Tuesday July 7th

First part of gale from west over cast weather lying to under easy sail with S.B. along side at 1 P.M. started the fluke chain put another one on at 3 P.M. commenced cutting light winds from westward over cast weather finished cutting and brace foreward so ends.

Cruising for Whales of the north west
Wednesday July 8th 1843

There 24 hours strong breezes from south and westward over cast weather boiling several ships in sight at 4 P.M. saw 60 ships bound off with flying colors

Lat 54 28 off
Long 147 20 W

Thursday July 9th

There 24 hours fresh gales from southward and eastward over cast weather with some rain some whales lower but did not succeed several ships in sight boiling and storing oil so ends lying to under short sail

Lat 54 35 off
Long 147 23 W

Friday July 10th

There 24 hours of gale from southward with rainy foggy weather first part boiling and storing oil at 5 P.M. finished boiling latter rising so ends under close reef main top sail

Lat 54 30 off
Long 147 30 W

Saturday July 11th

First part of gale from southward foggy rainy weather latter more moderate light airs from westward fine weather storing oil at 8 P.M. saw some whales lower but all in rain so ends

Lat 54 33 off
Long 147 28 W
