

July 28th 1822 Begins with light
winds from North Steer for the Island of
Sagadahoc Port Round North part
fresh winds though the night
At 8 AM Steer for St. Michaels
So in the day fresh winds from North
the ship in the trap of Sagadahoc

Monday July 29th 1822 At 10 AM the 24th hour
fresh winds from SE the Schoon
bore the sail steering SE By E At 10 PM
Made the Island of St. Michaels by off
Anchored though the night at daylight
stood in to the Bay At 8 AM stood
out to gain S. E. by S. fresh winds

Tuesday July 30th 1822 begins with fresh
winds from N on the And Clear weather
Steering out of the Bay of St. Michaels
At midnight stood in for the Bay
At daylight close in with the land
the latter part light winds and
Clear weather At 1 PM the employed
Maid of old sail Solend this day

Wednesday July 31st 1822 Light winds from
N. E. and Clear weather the Schoon
all sail steering SE Along the Coast of
St. Michaels Bore the old Main Sail
and give the Middle and Latter part
the wind from N. E. and Clear weather
At 1 PM the employed Maid Steer for
Main Sail and S. E. Solend steering
off to the South Eastern part of
St. Michaels

Thursday August 1st 1822 begins with light
winds from North and Clear weather
the Schoon to sail steering in St.
Michael Bay the latter part fresh winds
from West Still steering in the Bay
Sun to Sunken hills So ends this day

Friday August 2nd 1822 begins with light winds
from West the Schoon to sail standing
in to St. Michael Bay At 2 PM Tacked and
stood on to wind the latter part
the Middle and Latter part fresh winds
from West by South steering S. W. by N on
a wind At 8 AM took in the sail and
giving gale to the full Tackle top sail and
put flying gale So ends this day At 10 PM 29.10

Saturday August 3rd 1822 begins with light winds
and Clear weather the Schoon to sail that
would draw steering on to wind to the North with
the wind West At 3 PM Tackled steering weather
At 4 PM the wind shifted to SE Tackled and stood
West on to wind At 6 PM Made the Island of
Sagadahoc bearing S. W. by N stood in for the land
the Middle and Latter part light winds and
Clear weather So ends the Island bearing west

Sunday August 4th 1822 At 10 AM the 24th hour
Sail Mostly Schooners and one Stoop spoke the
Seri Miller of Providence Bore 4 Masts out with
60 bbls So ends Sagadahoc bearing West 6 Leagues Distance

Monday August 5th 1822 begins with light winds
from N. E. by E breeze from N. E. Made the sail
the latter part light winds and Clear weather
Sun to greater many showers and hills
Solend standing in for the Island of St.
George
