

Monday March 17th 1823 begins with light winds and clear weather
at 10 AM on board to the Southward the Middle fresh winds and
sprightly till 8 AM Much business taken bearing ESE 30 Miles
So Ends fresh winds and clear weather till 11 AM

Tuesday March 18th 1823 the first part fresh winds and clear
at 1 PM Made the Island of St. Thomas, bearing SE
20 Miles till 6 PM shifted sail fresh winds through the
night till day light Made all sail and stood to the South
on board till 10 AM the wind shifted to SW and sprightly
took in the sail so much heavier rains with thunder
and lightning at intervals West Dist 20 Miles

Wednesday March 19th 1823 begins with fresh winds from
at 4 AM Made all sail on board till 6 PM backed
to the West the wind SE at 2 PM took in all
sail the heavy squalls from SE with rain the latter
part light winds from South got on black fish
at 8 AM St. Thomas Dist 20 Miles

Thursday March 20th 1823 begins with pleasant breeze from SSE
course to St. Thomas the weather light winds
through the night the latter part light winds from S Westward the
St. Thomas SE Dist 30 Miles

Friday March 21st 1823 All this day light winds and clear
the Sea under all sail Cruising off SE of St. Thomas

Saturday March 22nd 1823 All this 24 hours light winds and clear
Shook King Indian Chief the Sea under all sail Cruising
off SE of St. Thomas from 10 to 20 miles

Sunday March 23rd 1823 begins with a squall took in
at 10 AM till 2 PM then on at 2 PM sail the wind shifted
to South the latter part the wind at 7 AM backed to
SE the latter part light winds and clear till 10 PM

Monday March 24th 1823 begins with light and clear weather
Sea very black fish taken there could not strike
the latter part squally the Island SE Dist 30 Miles

Tuesday March 25th 1823 begins with light winds and
cloudy till 2 PM took in the sail took a heavy squall
from SE with rain thunder and lightning at midnight
the wind shifted to SW and the weather clear Made all
sail the latter part for the Island the latter part light
winds and clear the Island SE 35 Miles Distance

Wednesday March 26th 1823 till this day light winds and clear
weather the Sea under all sail Cruising off SE of St. Thomas
St. Thomas Sea far back, So Ends this day

Thursday March 27th 1823 till this day light winds and
clear weather the Sea under all sail
Cruising off SE of St. Thomas 10 miles

Friday March 28th 1823 till this day light winds and clear weather
the Sea under all sail Cruising off SE of St. Thomas
latter part went on shore for North Solway this day

Saturday March 29th 1823 begins with light winds and clear weather
at 2 PM the boat returned with 60 barrels of water took
it in and put it below squally through the night took in
sail the latter part clear weather the Island SE Dist 30 Miles

Sunday March 30th 1823 begins with light fresh winds and clear
the Middle and latter part blowing a gale from South and
SE and raining the Island SE 15 Miles So Ends this

Monday March 31st 1823 begins with fresh winds and clear
the wind shifted to SW then to NW at 10 AM the Middle and
latter part light winds and clear the Sea under all
sail standing in for the Island So Ends the Island SE 20 miles

Tuesday April 1st 1823 till this day light winds and clear
got off 2 boat loads of wood the latter part employed cutting and
stringing it to way So Ends this day the Island SE 20 Miles

Wednesday April 2nd 1823 till this day light winds and clear
the Sea under all sail Cruising off the West part of the
Island spoke King's Plantation with 130 lbs of spruce oil
the latter part saw up the latter part So Ends this day

Thursday April 3rd 1823 till this day light winds and clear
Weather Cruising off the West part of the Island
Dist 20 Miles So Ends this day sail to Sea

Friday April 4th 1823 begins with light winds and clear weather
in company with the local winter took Alfred Blank ship
to work his passage home Capt. Southerton Bennett put
on board 150 Pounds Beef and 140 Pounds of pork 100 Pounds of
Bread and some flour for Blank ship to live on
the Middle and latter part fresh winds from West the Sea
under all sail standing SE So Ends this day

Saturday April 5th 1823 begins with light winds and clear
the latter part on shore got clothing to the latter
part cloudy So Ends St. Thomas South 15 miles Dist

Sunday April 6th 1823 begins with squally weather from East
the Middle light winds from SW the latter part calm
the Island SE Dist 15 Miles So Ends this day

Monday April 7th 1823 begins with light winds and cloudy till 2 PM
took to Squall from East the latter part till 3 PM
Monday March till 10 AM the wind shifted to SE
the Middle and latter part light winds and calm So Ends

Tuesday April 8th 1823 till this day light winds and calm the Sea SE 30 miles

Wednesday April 9th 1823 till this 24 hours begins with light winds
the Sea under all sail took to Squall from SW the latter part
the Middle and latter part light winds and clear the Sea SE 15 miles

Thursday April 10th 1823 begins with a calm till 9 AM took to Squall
from SW till 10 AM sail stood in the Middle and latter part
squally the Sea 15 Miles till the latter part the latter part
