

Wednesday March 5th 1828 The first part light winds from South the ship under all sail standing to the East and the Middle part the South part light from the ship under all sail steering South Sea and Chased one whale could not strike so ended 3 ships in sight Lat 46.42 South

Thursday March 6th 1828 The first part light winds from the ship under all sail steering South Sea. Ship M. L. Wood entered harbor and took in top gale and kept the top sail fresh winds thought the light at 6 AM saw whales landed and could not strike Sea many whales so ended 3 ships in sight Lat 47.24 South

Friday March 7th 1828 Begins with fresh winds from S of the ship under kept top sails Sea & Sunken Whales Chased and Struck one and killed her at 1 PM down took her at long side put the plank over on the latter part the wind shifted to S by and changed on at daylight blowing & gave part the cable on so ended this day Lat 48.11 South 2 ships in sight

Sat March 8th 1828 All these 24 hours blowing a gale of winds from S of the ship Laying by the Whale Lat 48.14 South

Sunday March 9th 1828 Begins with a gale of wind from S of the ship Laying by the whale the Middle part at 4 AM began to cut the whale so ended Lat 49.27

Monday March 10th 1828 Begins with fresh winds from S of the ship Laying by the whale at 3 PM finished cutting and began to hoist the Middle part the latter part the wind shifted to South Made all sail and steamed N by S so ended Boiling Lat 46.46 South

Tuesday March 11th All these 24 Light winds the first from South the ship under all sail steering N by S at 1 PM down took her at long side put the plank over on the latter part the wind shifted to S by and changed on at daylight blowing & gave part the cable on so ended this day Lat 48.11 South 2 ships in sight

Wednesday March 12th 1828 All these 24 hours light winds from South the ship under all sail Sea & Sunken Whales Struck one at Sundown. Cut from her at 8 PM got on board and took in sail for the night at day light Made all sail Sea & Sunken Whales Chased and at 1 PM took her at long side and put the cable on so ended Lat 46.35 South 9 ships in sight

Thursday March 13th 1828 Begins with light winds from South the ship Laying by the whale at 1 PM finished cutting and bore and struck at 1 PM Cut from her at 9 PM got on board and took in sail for the night at 1 PM began to hoist at daylight Made all sail at 7 PM Calm at 10 took a light breeze from West Stead to the South on board Sea and Chased whales could not strike so ended Boiling 6 ships in sight Lat 46.15 South

Friday March 14th 1828 Begins with light winds from West the ship under all sail standing to the South and wind at Sundown took in sail for the night the latter part blowing a gale from N of the ship Laying by so ended employed steering down and Boiling Lat 46.14 South

Sat March 15th 1828 All these 24 hours blowing a gale from N of the ship Laying by heading to the West and at 10 PM finished Boiling the latter part employed steering down Lat 46.28 South

Sunday March 16th 1828 Begins with a gale from N of the ship Laying by the Middle part at 10 AM shifted to S of the ship increased to a gale went to sleep so ended this day Lat 46.14 South

Monday March 17th 1828 Begins with a gale from South the ship Laying by heading to the West and the Middle part the wind shifted to S of the ship at daylight Made all sail and Stead to the South on a wind 5 ships in sight Lat 45.32 South

Tuesday March 18th 1828 Begins with light winds from N of the ship under all sail standing to the South and wind the Middle the same the latter part the wind shifted to S of the ship Chased and Struck Whales could not strike Shook ship enterprise with 800 lbs Lat 45.20 South 5 ships in sight
