

Thursday April 3^d 1828 Begins with light winds from S 3 the ship under all sail steering S S E at sundown took in sail for the night the middle and latter part thick Rainy the ship Laying By Lat 44° 30' South

Friday April 4th 1828 Begins with light winds from West and thick weather the Laying By the middle and latter part made all sail and steered S S E with the wind from S W S W and made all sail at the strike of the ship 65 fathoms So Ends Lat 45° 14' South

Saturday April 5th 1828 Begins with light winds from S W the ship under all sail See and Chase one whale and at the strike of the ship 4 P M came on a thick fog Layed back till 4 P M the fog lifted See whales Run for the top clear took in sail light winds though the light the latter part light North from S E made all sail See 12 sail and 10 whales thick weather Lat 45° 55' South 60 fathoms

Sunday April 6th 1828 All these 24 hours light winds from S E the ship under all sail spoke ship Eagle with 1800 bbls Richardson with 1750 bbls Contango of Sautack with 1150 at sundown took in sail the latter part made all sail So Ends 6 ships in sight Lat 46° 20' South

Monday April 7th 1828 Begins with light winds and thick weather the ship under all sail See whales Chase and at the strike of the ship at sundown took in sail the latter part blowing a gail from S W sent down all three top gallant yards took in the main top sail took in the rest of the boat and turned up the See quarter Boat So Ends Lat 45° 14' South

Tuesday April 8th 1828 Begins with a gale from S W the ship Laying By under stay sails heading S 3 the middle and latter part at 4 A M let the main top sail clear kept at daylight made all sail at 3 sent the main top gallant up and at 10 spoke ship Sally Ann with 1800 bbls Richardson So Ends thick Rainy weather Lat 44° 55' South

Wednesday April 9th 1828 All these 24 hours fresh gales the first part from S W the ship under all sail spoke ship George Foster with 1400 bbls at 4 P M See whales Chase and at the strike of the ship the latter part the wind from S W So Ends See Aberdeen whales lying fast to S in seaward Lat 44° 51' South

Thursday April 10th 1828 All these 24 hours fresh winds from S W See whales Chase and at the strike of the ship the latter part See many fin back and 2 ships to windward So Ends Lat 44° 23' South

Friday April 11th 1828 Begins with fresh winds from S W the ship under all sail standing on a wind on a wind at sundown took in sail for the night at 8 Calm at 10 squally with rain at day light made all sail and steered S S E with the wind from S W So Ends this day 65 fathoms Lat 43° 43' South

Saturday April 12th 1828 Begins with fresh winds from S W the ship under all sail steering for the at midnight the wind shifted to S E Steered S 3 at 3 A M William Simons died After a sickness of about 3 weeks at 11 spoke ship Chili of Liverpool J. Drew with 1400 bbls at Sundown buried the Man So Ends 60 fathoms Water Lat 41° 51' South

Sunday April 13th 1828 Begins with light winds from South the middle and latter part fresh winds from S W the ship under all sail standing on a wind to the S E the latter part kept the top sails So Ends Lat 41° 41' South Sound 100 fathoms Lat 41° 11' South Long 57° 00' West from which taking departure from

Monday April 14th 1828 Begins with fresh winds from S W the ship under double reef top sails standing on a wind to the S 3 at 10 P M took in the fore and Mizzen top sail blowing a gail though the light at daylight Monday at 10 let down the top sails on board the Mizzen top sail to the main top sail the main sail and turned a drift out of the top sails So Ends this day Lat 41° 07' South Long 55° 40' West
