

Monday January the 25th 1896
 this day pleasant weather the ship passed
 the long head to the port passed the long
 ramp with 8 battens of water the ship
 passed a tubelard green point with a leading
 break. And instantly struck it back took
 of the long head and the gale took sail
 Main sail fore sail fore top mast sail
 kept the fore top mast sail got the
 anchors of the bow after passing green
 point the wind was blow to the greatest
 extent was not a minute steady wind
 until was an anchor it mung the ships
 in 4 battens of water and a long ^{ship} and a
 bark bound out to the top of the harbor
 and our yards was constantly in motion
 I would not say that it is a
 Guiney to this harbor any month in
 the year to shorten sail of the long head
 to be shore of his ship and sails let
 the weather be ever so pleasant or
 windy be ever so light after passing
 green point hug the west shore if
 wind is light then you will take
 the island from the N.W. other wise
 stand 3 or 4 miles over toward the E
 shore then back and you will be most
 lucky to get in to the harbor & battens
 of water the health of the harbor
 of green point when the mountain covered
 with snow & white clouds & dense
 seven squalls during gusts of wind
 there is a boat sail of ships and boats
 chiefly English & American whale ships
 the keeper of the wharves out 1900 the other
 was the ^{keeper} And like wise the Margaret
 the wife of the ship came her and hits
 on a rather way

Tuesday January the 26th 1896
 this day strong gale from the S.E.
 sent down royal and top galant yards
 and raised the fore and main ^{and} gold
 Mast the later part of the night
 the night the gale started
 So ends this day
 Wednesday January the 27th 1896
 this day pleasant for this place
 the 1st watch it shore on liberty the
 harbor watch impeded it ship duty
 So ends this day

Thursday January the 28th 1896
 this day a gale from the S.E. 1 watch
 it shore on liberty the other in
 port the ships duty taking in water
 so forth So ends this day
 Friday January the 29th 1896
 this watch it shore on liberty
 the other in port the ships duty
 So ends this day
 this day fine gale from the N.W. and
 pleasant weather 1 watch it shore
 on liberty the other watch was in
 plaid it blanking the head taking in
 water painting the keel and stern
 and so forth several vessel went out
 this day a the Marshall & Quirk man came
 in at 4 p.m. & mounted out 1410 blbls
 So ends this day Saturday January the

 this day strong gale all hands on board
 hooked the standard stock got it
 hauled from the shore to in our port
 bent anchor to it at 4 p.m. & the whale
 ships came in the America to get 90 tons
 from home 40 blbls of oil the other was the
