

Thursday May the 18 1896
this day pleasant weather the crew
was in flood the duty working morning
and so forth 240
So ends this day

Friday May the 19 1896
the day strong gales the watch in hand the
ship duty so ends this day 241

Saturday May the 20 1896
this day strong gales from the S &
1 watch to shore on liberty the other on
ships duty so ends this day 242

Sunday May the 21 1896
this day a severe gale from the N &
with plenty of rain several ships dragged
so ends this day 243

Monday May the 22 1896
this day strong winds several ships dragged
their anchors and was forced to let go their
sevent anchor we by very still the boat
was passing back and forth to the
shore on ships duty 244
So ends this day

Tuesday May the 23 1896
the day pleasant weather and moderate
winds at 9 AM the anchor was hauled
sail at 10 AM the boat of Governor
and sent the boat to shore for a boat
stern she returned at 11 AM then more
up and steamed N & out of the bay to the
islands so ends this day 245

Wednesday May the 24 1896
this day strong winds and fine weather
sailed at 6 AM under full sail all hand
in flood at 10 AM the anchor and chains
were hauled up Cape Horn Cove at 11 AM 17 logs
so ends this day 246

Thursday May the 25 1896
this day strong winds from the S & steamed
N & the watch in flood the waves were
getting the boats very for unloading and
so forth so ends this day 247

Friday May the 26 1896
this day strong winds from the S & the crew
steamed at 6 AM under a sephant piece of
sail 2 men to the mast head saw 1 plain
back nothing else a very heavy swell
from the S & the watch in hand the waves
were so ends this day Lat 31° 40' Long 180° 30' 248

Saturday May the 27 1896
this day strong wind and squalls of wind and
rain saw 1 plain back a heavy swell from the
S & the crew steamed by compass was E until
11 AM then steamed N by E at 11 AM saw French
rock having E by N 25 miles steamed to
see it so ends this day Lat 31° 11' Long 182° 11' 249

Sunday May the 28 1896
this day a strong breeze from the S & with
a heavy swell saw nothing at
1 PM French rock bore N 1st 2 logs
steamed N by E for Sandy Island at 4
PM steamed N by E at 11 PM made Sandy
Island having N 1st 14 logs
so ends this day Lat 29° 44' Long 251

Monday May the 30 1896
this day strong gales from the E with
a high sea at 4 PM the boat to the
wind the veteran took at 4 AM
more ship to the N & at 6 AM the
island bore E 1st 4 logs heard
first for the 12th March the island
here at 11 AM 1st 2 miles this is a high mountain
island covered in green moss & black sand 252
