saw plenty of whale whales at 1 p.m.
saw the boats the land boat got 1
small whale at 4 p.m. took the whale at
5 p.m. and began to cut at 7 p.m. got the
cutting at 4 p.m. began to load 427
So ends this day Satt 25.11.36 Long 144.00

Wednesday November the 23rd 1836
this day pleasant weather at 12 noon saw got three
haling so ends this day Satt 25.11.36 Long 144.00 428

Thursday November the 24th 1836
this day thick overcast sky and squally
weather with light winds spoke the ship
Chimbleth Starbuck both boat 28 months
2400 blbls of oil still full 429
steamed to the S.E.
So ends this day Satt 25.11.36 Long 144.00

Friday November the 25th 1836
at 1 p.m. pleasant weather saw 3 ships
at 4 p.m. spoke the independence fisher
15 months 900 blbls of oil 430
So ends this day Satt 25.11.36 Long 144.00

Saturday November the 26th 1836
this day squally rainy weather at 9 p.m. saw
a large whale load the 3 boats the worst
boat got the whale at 5 p.m. took the whale
at long side and commenced cutting at
half past 6 got the head of the whale
hailed with the independence and we took
the head we saw the Chimbleth Starbuck
cutting a large whale at 4 p.m. got the
haly in at 11 p.m. spoke the richard M.C.
Clewin 16 months out 900 blbls of oil 431
So ends this day Satt 26.11.36 Long 144.00

Sunday November the 27th 1836
this day squally weather winds from the N.E.
the independence in company we are implied
at halting
So ends this day Satt 26.11.36 Long 144.00 432

Monday November the 28th 1836
this day pleasant weather at 11 p.m. got three
haling at 4 p.m. loaded the whale with
the independence steamed E. by E. wind 433
So ends this day Satt 26.11.36 Long 144.00

Tuesday November the 29th 1836
this day light winds from the W. steamed
at 4 p.m. got a fluke chain from the
independence and left her at 10 p.m.
spoke the Star of London Captain Hall 7 months
20 blbls of oil
So ends this day Satt 29.11.36 Long 149.00 434

Wednesday November the 30th 1836
this day light winds from the N.E. and pleasant
weather steamed E. by E. under short sail
at 11 p.m. saw a large ship to the west
the watch implied it was a ship 435
So ends this day Satt 29.11.36 Long 149.00

Thursday December 1st 1836
this day a strong gale from the west saw 2
ships at 1 p.m. started her to the N.
under a close reefed main top sail
So ends this day Satt 26.11.36 Long 149.00 436

Friday December the 2nd 1836
this day fresh gale part and a high sea at the
part light winds and pleasant weather
winds from the W. at 4 p.m. made sail
and sent the main top galant and fore
sail yard and left 437
So ends this day Satt 25.11.36 Long 149.00
