Wednesday March 15th 1843

All this day strong breezes & pleasant weather, steering SW, employed at repairing the main sail
Lat by obs 00.22.28
Long by Chron 168.51.20

Thursday 16th

First part strong breezes & pleasant weather, steering SW, by W, finished the main sail & bent it about the main top gallant sail to repair. At sun set shortened sail for the night. At 2 P.M. luffed to the wind heading to the North & lay aback till day light, latter part steering West with all sail but finished & bent the main top gallant sail, sail, making

Long by Chron 170.07.10
Osburgs directory on the lat & Long not there

Friday 17th

Fine breezes & pleasant weather steering SW, with all sail out. At sun set took in the light sails, latter part steering WSW, with all sail out
Lat by obs 00.32.5

Saturday 18th

Fine breezes & pleasant weather steering WSW with all sail out. At sun set shortened sail & luffed to the wind heading to the South, latter part steering SW by W, with all sail out
Lat by obs 00.58.5
Long by Chron 174.33.20

Sunday 19th

Fine breezes & pleasant weather steering SW with all sail out, at sun set shortened sail for the night. At day light made sail at 9 P.M. saw sperm whales several & caught one at 11 took him along side
Lat by obs 00.18.20
Long by Chron 176.08.20

Ship Balenas. Capt R. Manchester
Monday March 20th 1843

All this day light winds & pleasant weather. At 8 AM finished cutting & stood to the South East. At 2 P.M. tacked to the North. At 11 saw New Van tucket bearing in compass NW, dist 10 miles
Lat by obs at noon 00.32.28
Long by Chron 176.23.20
Land bearing SW by W 6 miles

Tuesday 21st

Light breezes & pleasant weather steering by the wind to the SW. At 9 AM finished boiling turned up 18.30. At 2 P.M. wore ship to the South. At 9 saw the land. At noon bore SW dist 6 miles
Lat by obs 00.08.28

Wednesday 22nd

All this day fine breezes & pleasant weather steering to the SW. At 8 P.M. tacked ship to the Northward for purposes
Lat by obs 00.19.5
Long by Chron 176.43

Thursday 23rd

Fine breezes & pleasant weather steering to the North. At 2 AM saw a ship to the leeward kept off. At 5 spoke the ship Edward of Hudson the Capt came on board she had taken 40 blb since she left Stehete, Middle part steering to the South. Latter part steering N. by E
Lat by obs 00.14.28

Capt Jaggat tells us that he buried the right arm of a man that left us at Stehete on the 9th, she belonged to N York state, about 24 years old

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
