All this day strong winds and cloudy steering by the wind to the S. employed at cooping and stowing down oil.

First and middle parts fresh winds from SE. latter part light wind from SSE

Thursday Nov 7th 1844.

All this day light winds and clear weather steering by the wind to the S. at noon spoke the Bark Columbia of Sag Harbor 16 1/2 months out 2000 whale 150 sperm.

Friday 8th

First part light winds and clear weather middle part the same, latter part fresh breezes At 8 AM saw sperm whales the boat without success, at 11 AM on board, saw the Columbia take a whale

Saturday 9th

Fresh winds the whales in sight at 4 PM landed the boat and caught one of them at 8 took him along side at day light commenced cutting at 10 finished, latter part ruggled with strong winds

All this day strong winds from SE and very ruggled at 10 PM finished boiling turned up 38 Sperm 3 years out this day
