This day comes in with light breeze from the S. W. the ship standing to the Southward to draw several vessels. Lowered two Boats for a Sulphur Bottom without success. latter part calm
Lat 26° 09' Long 76° 46' W.

Thursday Feb. 28th

Steering to the Eastward. Saw porpoises Employed sitting up. Shook's Washing Ship. &c. a Bark in light steering to the Westward. Lat 36.20 Long. by Chron 75.41

Friday Feb 29th

Thursday Oct 27th Comes in with fresh Breezes from the Ship steering to the Eastward Middle part of night latter part Blackfishing Caught 10 Small ones Saw several vessels Lat. 56.50 Long 144.0

Saturday March 1st

comes in with light Breezes from S.W. the Ship standing to the Eastward at 6 P.M. spoke the Hector of N.Y. bound into Balakuanas latter part blowing fresh. From the Southward the Ship heading to the Westward under close reefed main top sail & foresail one man off duty got his fingers badly cut running blubber. Lat 36.54 Long 74 49

Wore Ship, and I and Set the Mizzen Topsail attending
to the Eastward. latter part Set the fore Topsail double reefed
& the Jib and Main Sail Saw Blackfish two men sick.

Wednesday March 5th

South the Ship steering E Middle & latter part light breeze
on S.W. with fresh weather steering E. & E. two men Sick
employed on ships Duty the island of St Marys in sight 10 miles
off bearing O. S. E. Lat 36.50 Long 79.51 W

Thursday March 6th

Comes in with breeze from S.W. and
thick hazy weather the ship standing on for the land
middle part calm. Latter part light breezes from the
westward. Employed scrubbing ship & at noon the pumps
bearing E.S.E. 12 miles

Friday March 7th

Comes in calm weather the frigate bearing
 E.S.E. at 2 P.M. the Boats ahead of the ship towing
 trying to get to an anchorage before dark. but did not succeed.
 Wind freshened tide at Sunset took up the Boats and
 hauled off for the night. Middle part calm. latter part
 light Breeze from N.W. the ship starting up the
 Bay at 10 P.M. let go anchor in five fathoms water
 and furled the Sails in the evening a Boats crew Watch
 there for the evening with liberty to stay until nine P.M. 4 men Wm. Wood
 Benjamin Bond
 Samuel Spauld
 Saturday March 8th

Comes in with thick Weather & calm about 9. C. A. M.
 Hoist up anchor and towed in shore close to the Watering
 place Employed painting &c about 8 A. M. Ward, Block.
 & the Apparanch Comd on Board Benjamin. Still ashore
 without leave. So Ends with fine Weather, the Ship
 lying in five fathoms. 60 fathoms Cable out
