

Ship Plover, of New Bedford, off Port
Friday November 5th 1858
I. Beeze. All these 24 hours strong breeze from
E. N. E. to East, steered W. N. W. and S. W.
shortened and made sail, saw nothing,
So Ends, Lat. 24. 14. S. Long 49. 46. East.

Saturday, November 6th 1858
Pleasant. calm. with a strong breeze from E. N. E.
and cloudy, steered W. S. W. under short
sail, at sunset took in sail, heading North,
at daylight made sail, and steered W. S. W.
so nothing, So Ends, Lat. 24. 41 S. Long 49. 30 East

Sunday, November 7th 1858
Pleasant. calm. with light winds from the East,
at 3. P. M. squally, heaved by the wind
to the East, the wind S. N. E. at sunset
better weather, shortened sail and were
ship to the west, at daylight made all
sail, heading N. W. at 10. A. M. saw three
sails, So Ends, Lat. 24. 03. S. Long 49. 48. East.

Monday, November 8th 1858
Barks, Mechanick, Mepenger. All these 24 hours fine pleasant weather,
shortened and made sail, spoke the Bark
Mechanick of New Port, R. I. Larry Master
36 months 700 bls of Oil, 350. S. 450 whale
spoke the Mepenger 1700. 1450. whale 250 S.
saw another sail, So Ends, Lat 24. 23. S. Long 49. 44

Tuesday November 9th 1858
Bark Pacific. calm. with a nice breeze from the N. E.
and fine weather, heading N. N. W. under all
sail, spoke the Mechanick and got 2000
pounds of yarns from her, spoke the Bark
Belle, at 8. P. M. parted company, and
steered west, latter part under full sail
at 12. noon spoke the Barque Pacific
of New Bedford. Shearman, Master, 39 1/2
months out 900 S. 100 whale, So Ends, Lat 24. 18 S.

Dauphon, Augustus, N. Perkins, Master
Wednesday, November 10th 1858
Thunder. calm. with a light breeze from the East, under
all sail, heading to the S. W. in company with the
Pacific, at sunset shortened sail, middle part
raining with thunder and lightning, latter part
part strong breeze from the S. S. E. saw Sulphur
Bottoms, So Ends, Lat. none, sun obscure.

Thursday, November 11th 1858
Rainy. calm. with strong trade and rugged, at 3. 30
P. M. steered west, saw breaches and a Sulphur
Bottoms, at sunset shortened sail, heading
N. E. middle part squally and rainy,
at daylight made same sail, and were
ship to the S. S. W. Pacific in company, So Ends,
Lat by Obs. 25. 10. S. Long by Obs. none.

Friday, November 12th 1858
B. Pacific. calm. with a strong gale from the S. S. E. and rugged,
heading South hove too, at 4. P. M. kept off
N. W. at sunset took in the fore sail, heading
to the E. S. E. middle part strong breeze,
at 4. A. M. spoke the Pacific, steered N. W.
So Ends, Lat by Obs. 24. 20. S. Long 52. 02. East.

Saturday, November 13th 1858
Squally. calm. with brisk trade and cloudy weather,
steering W. N. W. Pacific, in company, at sunset heaved
to the wind to the South, and took in sail, middle
and latter parts squally rainy weather, the wind
baffling, two sails in sight, shortened & made
sail, So Ends, Lat. 24. 30. S. Long by Obs. 49. 37. 30 E.

Sunday, November 14th 1858
Squally. calm. with rainy squally weather wind from
N. E. to S. E. heading different courses, shortened
and made sail, saw two sails, So Ends.
Lat by Obs. 24. 30. S. Long Obs. 49. 02. 30. Lunar 49. 12. 30 E.
