Europa	Wednesday March 23 rd 1859 Begins with moderate wind from the S.W. and fair weather, stowed S. by E. under short sail, at sunset took in sail and heaved by the wind to the west, at daylight made all sail, saw a sail, at 9 A.M. spoke the Barque Europa of New Bedford, Thimney Master, 37 months 500. S. 900 whale oil, saw another sail, So Ends, Lat 27. 45. S.
J. Abigail	Thursday March 24 th 1859 baw. with brisk wind from the S. E. heading S. W. under all sail, at 3 P.M. spoke the ship Abigail of New Bedford, Smith master, 28 months out 800. W. 400. Sperm. Oil, at 4 P.M. squally, at sunset shortened sail, at 7 P.M. parted company standing to the S. W. middle part moderate, at sunrise made all sail, saw the Abigail heading to the Eastward, at 11.30 A.M. wore ship to the N. by E. So Ends, Lat 28. 23. S. Long 106. 17 E.
Yard	Friday March 25 th 1859 Begins with a light breeze from the E. S. E. steering N. by E. under all sail, at sunset shortened sail, at daylight made sail, the wind West, sent up the Mizzen J. G. yard, latter part light air, So Ends, Lat 28. 00. South.
Pleasant	Saturday March 26 th 1859 baw. with light pleasant weather and continued so through the 24 hours, heading N. E. under all sail, saw nothing, So Ends, Lat, 27. 35. S. Long 107. 06. E.
All Sail	Sunday March 27 th 1859 Begins with light pleasant weather heading to the N. E. saw two Barks, one of them cutting, called it the Kithteen, at sunset took in sail, at daylight wore ship and set double reefs, Courses Tabb & Spanker, So Ends, Lat 27. 12. S. Long 106. 59

Bk. Europa	Monday March 28 th 1859 baw. with brisk wind from the S. E. and flauy, heading S. W. under double reefs V. at 3.30 P.M. spoke the Europa, middle part rigged, at daylight wore ship to the S. E. and set double reefed top sails, So Ends, Lat, 27. 35. South,
Rugged	Tuesday March 29 th 1859 Begins with a strong breeze from the S. E. and cloudy weather, heading fair S. E. to E. S. E. under double reefs V. at sunset shortened sail, middle & latter parts blowing strong, saw a sail, So Ends, Lat by Obs. 26. 41 S. Long by Theo. 108. 01. 45. East,
Rugged	Wednesday March 30 th 1859 baw. with strong trade and rugged, heading E. S. E. by the wind under double reefs V. at sunset wore ship to the S. W. and shortened sail, middle and latter part strong trade, So Ends Lat 26. 48. South,
Rugged	Thursday March 31 st 1859 baw. with strong trade, and rugged heading S. S. W. under short sail, at sunset took in sail, at daylight, wore ship to the N. E. and made all sail, latter part pleasant, So Ends, Lat 26. 41 Long 108. 57 E.
Light Winds	Friday March April 1 st 1859 All these 24 hours light pleasant weather heading to the E. S. E. shortened and made sail, saw nothing, So Ends, Lat. 26. 13. S. Long 108. 30
Light winds	Saturday April 2 ^d 1859 Throughout these 24 hours light trade & fine weather, heading S. S. W. under all sail, broke out water & m. claps. So Ends, Lat by Obs. 26. 41. S. Long. none,
Pleasant	Sunday April 3 ^d 1859 baw. with light trade and fine weather, heading S. S. W. under all sail, shortened & made sail, latter part strong breeze, wore ship to the North, So Ends, Lat. by Obs. 26. 40. S. Long 107. 30. East,
