 108.52

Friday March 29th 1861
 Begins with a strong breeze from S. S. E.
 heading East under close reefs & Saen
 two Sails, so Ends. Lugged. Lat 26.57 S. 107.19

Saturday, March 30th 1861
 Comd. with a strong wind from the S. S. E.
 and rugged heading East under close
 reefs & at sunset wore ship to the S. W.
 and shortened sail, middle & latter part
 blowing a gale, so Ends. Lat 27.12 S

Sunday, March 31st 1861
 Comd. with a strong gale from S. S. E. and
 a bad sea running, heading S. W. under
 Main top Sail & Spencers, middle & latter
 parts blowing strong. Saw a sail, so Ends.
 Lat by Obs 27.30 S. Long 107.44 E

Monday, April 1. 1861
 Comd. with a strong gale from the S. S. E.
 and rugged, heading to the East under
 Main top Sail & spencers middle part more
 moderate, at daylight made sail and
 wore ship to the S. W. Saw the Draco, some
 other sail, at 10. A. M. tacked to the Eastward,
 so Ends. Lat 27.44 S. Long 108.58

Tuesday April 2^o 1861
 Bk. North West, Begins with a moderate breeze from the
 South heading to the East under all sail, at
 5. P. M. spoke the North West of New London
 12 months 350 S. 350. W. shortened sail heading S. S. W.
 at daylight made sail heading S. S. E. latter part
 blowing so Ends. Lat 28.09. Long 108.30

Off New Holland. A. N. Perkins, Master

 S. Breeze, Comd. with a strong breeze from the S. W. and
 some squally, heading to the Eastward under
 whole top Sails & at 3. P. M. shortened sail & wore
 ship to the West middle & latter parts better weather
 heading to the S. S. W. so Ends. Lat 28.18 S. Long 108.15 E

Thursday, April 4th 1861
 Bk. Messengers, Comd. with a fresh breeze from the S. W. and a
 heavy swell running, steering N. N. W. at 2. P. M.
 Bk. Pamela, Saw a sail, at 8.30. spoke the Bark Messengers
 of New Bedford 22 months out 200. shortened sail
 of New Bedford 22 months out 200. shortened sail
 heading to the S. S. W. at sunrise
 wore ship to the S. by E. and made sail, at
 10. A. M. spoke the Pamela, and John Joseph saw
 a large whale breaching, lowered for him in
 company with the Pamela latter part raining,
 but skin of the whale so Ends, no lbs

Friday April 5th 1861
 Messengers Pamela Comd. with a strong breeze and some squally,
 the Boats off looking for the whales, but all
 in vain, at 2. P. M. took up the Boats, and ran
 N. N. W. one hour, then ran N. S. W. at 5.30
 the Pamela saw a whale towed two Boats
 from each ship but all in vain for the want
 of more daylight, jammed with the Messengers
 at 11. P. M. parted company, at 2. A. M. steered
 N. S. W. & S. W. Saw several sails so Ends.
 Lat 27.48 S. Long

Saturday, April 6th 1861
 Bk. Awashanks, Begins with a strong breeze from the S. S. W.
 and rugged, steering S. E. & E. S. E. under Fore
 Sail & Main top Sails, saw the Parachute at
 sunset took in the Fore Sail & luffed to the
 S. W. at daylight made some sail, saw three sails
 latter part more moderate, running off to the
 West North west, at noon spoke the Awashanks,
 12 months 6 months out, 150 W. 50. Spence Oil
 so Ends. Lat, 27.49 S. Long, 107.41 30 South
