Come with light breezes from S.E. at 2.0 m.  
tacked to the Westward two sail in sight  
one standing to the Westward the other to the  
Eastward light breezes through the Night from  
S.E. to S.W. latter part light breezes  
Latter a current setting to the N.W. Lat by Obs. 00° 54' S.  
Long . . . 25° 20' W.

63<sup>rd</sup>

Monday February 3. 1834

Come with light breezes from South  
at 6.0 m. tacked to the S.E. brisk breezes through  
the Night from South to S.W. latter part  
light airs from South Lat by Obs. 00° 47' S.  
Long . . . 24° 20' W.

64<sup>th</sup>

Tuesday February 4. 1834

Come with light airs from South by West  
steering S.E. by E. light airs through the Night  
South to S.W. latter part light airs from S.W.  
standing to the S.E. Employed in bending a  
New Main topsail at 1.0 m. saw a ship and  
a ship in sight a N.W. current Lat by Obs. 00° 40' S.  
Long . . . 23° 40' W.

65<sup>th</sup>

Wednesday February 5. 1834

Come with light airs from S.W. steering  
S.E. at 1.0 m. saw ship and to the N.W. at 5.0 m.  
a Boat <sup>boarded</sup> us from a Portuguese Bark Ship they  
were in distress for the want of provisions  
with (60 souls on board only 3 days provision  
on board) I sold them one Pipe of brand and  
2 barrels of beef Middle and latter part  
calm Lat by Obs. 00° 16' S.  
Long . . . 23° 50' W.

66<sup>th</sup>

Thursday February 6. 1834

Come with light airs from S.E. by S.  
standing to the S.W. Middle and latter part  
calm a current setting to the N.W. Lat by Obs. 00° 15' S.  
Long . . . 24° 30' W.

67<sup>th</sup>

Friday February 7. 1834

Come with light airs from S.S.W.  
stood to the S.E. at 7.0 m. spoke the Sloop  
of New London Capt. Smith 8. m. out 2,000 lbs. of oil  
light airs through the Night from S.W. to S.E.  
latter part light airs from N.W. to S.E.  
Lat by Obs. 00° 05' S.  
Long by Chron. 24° 17' W.

68<sup>th</sup>

Saturday February 8. 1834

Come with light airs from S.S.W. steering  
S.E. a ship in sight standing to the S.E.  
light breezes through the Night from S.W. to S.E.  
latter part light airs calm and Rainy  
Lat by Obs. 00° 12' S.  
Long . . . 23° 30' W.

69<sup>th</sup>

Sunday February 9. 1834

Come with light airs from S.E. steering  
S.W. at 4.0 m. the wind shifted in to the N.W.  
steered S.W. set the studdensails a ship in sight  
steering to the southward calm through the Night  
latter part light airs from N.W. steering South  
a ship in sight. Lat by Obs. 00° 33' S.  
X 23.45 Lat by Chron. 23° 45' Long by Chron. 23° 20' W.

70<sup>th</sup>

Monday February 10. 1834

Come with light air from N.W. steering  
South at 2.0 m. spoke the Bark Leader of New Bedford  
Capt. Swift 44 days from New Bedford light airs  
and calm through Night tacked several times  
during the Night latter part light airs  
from South Lat by Obs. 00° 46' S.  
Long by Chron. 24° 15' W.

71<sup>st</sup>

Tuesday February 11. 1834

Come with light breezes from South at 1.0 m.  
tacked to the S.W. wind S.E. Moderate breezes  
through the Night from S.E. to S.E. by E. steering  
by the wind latter part brisk breezes and  
squally wind S.E. Lat by Obs. 00° 32' S.  
Long by Chron. 23° 52' W.
