554 days Remarks Sunday April 24<sup>th</sup>

first part  
of these 24 hours light winds from the  
S<sup>W</sup> ship heading to the S<sup>W</sup> at 2 PM  
middle part the bark latter part at 3 PM  
ward ship to the S<sup>W</sup> so ends ship under all  
sail rocks bearing 1/2 distance 10 miles

555 days Remarks Monday April 25<sup>th</sup>

first part  
light winds from the S<sup>W</sup> ship heading  
to the S<sup>W</sup> at 2 PM ward ship to the S<sup>W</sup> at 2 PM  
saw the Bark Alabama wheeling out to  
sloop her & found she had struck a whale  
& fast his line & struck a mother & got him with  
hook in sail middle part fire ship heading  
to the S<sup>W</sup> latter part at 4 PM ward ship  
to the S<sup>W</sup> so ends the day

556 days Remarks Tuesday April 26<sup>th</sup>

first part  
light winds from the S<sup>W</sup> ship heading  
to the S<sup>W</sup> at 2 PM saw the Rocks bearing  
1/2 distance 15 miles at 4 PM ward ship  
to the S<sup>W</sup> middle & latter part the same  
to day comes on B. L. Smithing so ends  
the day

557 days Remarks Wednesday April 27<sup>th</sup>

first part  
light whole topsail breeze from the S<sup>W</sup> ship  
heading to the S<sup>W</sup> at 6 shortend sail  
middle part the same latter part at 6 PM  
Mr Howland who is in charge of the watch  
gave orders to reef topsail & found that one man  
was missing by the name of Thomas Sarking  
who was a sleep down below he asked him  
what he was doing down below when he  
had a watch on deck he said he was down  
there a sleep he told him he should

Mr Master crossing off French Rocks  
have his watch below slept for summer  
he then began to give insolence & told  
the 2<sup>d</sup> officer that no body could stop  
his watch below Mr Howland told him he  
was getting him self into more trouble he  
used some other insulted language & Mr Howland  
told him to go a aft on the quarter deck he  
refused Mr Howland there upon came down  
to get a pair of irons to put upon him he  
refused to be put into irons & then went  
a long to bring him a gift & he struck at  
me four or five times Capt. Macy came up  
& ordered him to be put in the stocks &  
then seized him up & all the man coming  
arming them selves with clubs & then coming  
down below to arm myself & so did the 2<sup>d</sup>  
officer so we did not bear down but a few  
seconds before we did a noise we went up &  
found the Capt. had been forward to tell them  
to go below they refused & struck a him with  
clubs & sticks of wood he then took a scrub-  
hoon & struck at one Theodore Williams  
one of the men by the name of Robert  
Sailor then struck at Capt. Macy with a club  
& cut a very bad place in his head & striking  
him in several places a bout the back Capt. Macy  
came a aft & we went forward Capt. with  
a Revolver my self with a cutler & Mr Howland  
with a Revolver we drove them below & they  
could not to me to come down there if I don't  
causing very bad names Capt. Robney then told  
me to call up Theodore Williams Robert  
Sailor Ammanuel Brit & John Bradley they  
being the chief Ring leaders & he then ordered  
them to be seized up & employed them also flogged  
Thomas Sarking John Bradley & Ammanuel Brit  
promised to behave due the like a gain was  
liberated & went to duty put Thomas Sarking  
Theodore Williams in irons & last confinement  
this put a stop to the mutiny & nothing but  
this would have put a stop to the mutiny for every  
man with a few exceptions threaten to kill us
