Monday⁶ These 24 hours commences with light winds and calms employed in haying saw one whale a going to the N^E

Tuesday⁷ These 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N^E saw a number of whals loaded three boats but with ought seven saw the Cornelius Howland take a whale middle part rainy latter part foggy spoke the Champion with five whals

²²Wednesday⁸ These 24 hours commences with light winds from the W a strong to the E a long the ice finished haying middle and latter part fine

Thursday⁹ These 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the W and some foggy middle part clear saw a number of ships latter part foggy employed in storing down in the main hold

²³Friday¹⁰ These 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the E saw whals in the ice loaded and the bow boat struck took him a long side and commenced to cut got in the head and loaded two boats and the Starboard boat struck took him a long side light winds and calms

Saturday¹¹ commences with light winds employed in cutting middle part pushed cutting spoke the Murlin and the Ellen War employed in haying no ends
