These 24 hours commences with fine

latter part of capt of S.C. found the ice
heavy in shore the capt on board of the
reindeer so ends

Monday²⁹ These 24 hours commences
with light winds and fine wether
a stery C in company with the reindeer
at 3 p.m. saw whales loared all four
boats and the starboard boat struck
at 4 p.m. took him a long side and
cut him in latter part saw the reindeer
get a whale so ends

Tuesday³⁰ These 24 hours commences
with strong winds from the S.E.
middle part fine latter part employed
in boyling and stowing down saw
whales and loared in company with the
Reindeers boats and they struck one
so ends Lat 64.10

Wednesday¹ of May

These 24 hours commences with fine
wether employed in boyling loared
several times for whales but with ought
success latter part fine

Thursday² These 24 hours commences
with fine wether and light winds from
the S.E. employed in boyling latter part
saw whales loared and the bow boat
struck took him a long side and cut him in
the next morning so ends

Friday³ of May These 24 hours
commences with light winds from
the S.E. employed in boyling and stowing
down in company with the reindeer middle
part foggy latter part the same

Saturday⁴ These 24 hours commences
with light winds from the S.E. employed
in boyling saw no whales middle part
foggy latter part the same

Sunday⁵ These 24 hours commences
with light winds from the S.E. finished
boyling middle part a long a back
in the ice the ice a closing down on
us fast latter part the same

Monday⁶ These 24 hours commences
with light winds from the S.E. employed
in stowing down oil in the main
hatch middle and latter part
in the ice the Reindeer of our lee
in the ice latter part finished stowing

Tuesday⁷ These 24 hours commences
with light winds from the S.E. and some
snow middle part saw a ship in clear
water latter part got ought of the heavy
ice so ends

Wednesday⁸ These 24 hours fine
wether winds from the N a stery through
the ice to the N saw eight ships latter
part spoke the gay head and steered
a long the ice to the S.W.
