

Tuesday¹⁹ of May 1868

There 24 hours commences with light South winds & lying fast in the ice with thirty three sail the men & trawling back and forth on the ice middle and latter part snow so ends

Lat 63.10 Long

Wednesday²⁰ There 24 hours commences with light south winds & lying fast in the ice all sail furled middle and latter part the same forty sail in the ice so ends

Lat 63.20

Thursday²¹ There 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & lying fast in the ice in company with forty sail first part let go one hegg with seventy fathom of chain on it in forty fathom of water latter part hove it up it did not hold the ship the ice was so heavy so ends

Lat 63.27 Long 178.40

Friday²² There 24 hours commences with light winds from the W all hands & gon a gunning on the ice middle part the capt went to the Bay head on the ice latter part fine

Lat 63.30

Saturday²³ There 24 hours commences with strong winds from the S furled all sail middle part the same latter part sent down the main spanker gaff and furl it so ends no clear water in sight from the mast head

Sunday²⁴ of May 1868

There 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & lying in the ice with all sail furled in company with forty sail latter part the same

Lat 63.58

Monday²⁵ There 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & set all sail and crowded through the ice a buoy a mile and middle and latter part fast in the ice

Tuesday²⁶ There 24 hours commences with light winds from the N & lying in the ice some of the ships has gone ought of sight to the N of us

Wednesday²⁷ There 24 hours commences with light winds from the S & working through the ice in company with the Commodore latter part got ought in clear water steered of to the W wither thick

Thursday²⁸ There 24 hours commences with light winds from the N saw the land of Cape Thadvis latter part calms

Friday²⁹ commences with light winds from the S & steered a long the ice to the N & saw nothing of the Cape middle part fine saw no ships
