

Friday 9 of June 1868

Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the N.E. a lying in the ice with all sail furled middle part bent over kegs on to our chain and let it go latter part clear a strong current a setting the ice by us to the E

Wednesday 10 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the S.E. took over anchor and stood to the W through the ice latter part the wind died a way let go over anchor latter part fine

Thursday 11 Shore 24 hours commences with light wind from the W speak the Montebello the land in sight dist three miles middle part anchored thick and foggy latter part the same

Friday 12 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds and calms a lying at anchor and the natives came off from the shore latter part clear spoke the Ellen Mar saw several ships so ends this day

Saturday 13 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the W took over anchor and stood to the E a long the land

14 June

Sunday 14 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the N.W. a strong standing a long the land to the W middle part it calms dropped over anchor latter part foggy took over anchor so ends

Monday 15 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds and foggy in company with the Ellen Mar latter part got in to the ice let go over small anchor so ends

Tuesday 16 Shore 24 hours foggy a lying in the ice with over small anchor down and the ice a drifting by us to the E middle and latter part clear land dist three miles of Cape Behan

Wednesday 17 Shore 24 hours fine a lying in the ice with over flag down latter part let go over big anchor the Ellen Mar with us so ends

Thursday 18 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the N a lying in the ice with two anchors down and the ice a going by us with the tide at 7 am all of the ice went passed us hove over anchors up and set all sail and stood in to the W latter part it came in thick and foggy
