

Wednesday 12 of Aug 1868

Shore 24 hours commences with light winds and rainy first part saw a whale loared three boats and chased until 2 p.m. and came on board middle part foggy

Thursday 13 Shore 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N.W. steering of to the W. middle part rainy and more moderate latter part calms employed in mending the starboard boat no end spoke the islander

Friday 14 Shore 24 hours commences with calms at 5 p.m. spoke the islander middle part light winds from the N.W. steering to the W. middle and latter part fine spoke the islander

Lat 56.40 Long 168.00

Saturday 15 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the N. middle part strong winds took in light sail steering to the E. latter part war ship to the N.W. doubled reefed the topsails the islander

Lat 57.15 Long 168.47

Sunday 16 Shore 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N. steering to the N.E. saw the islander middle part more wind doubled reefed the topsails and furled the main sail latter part war ship to the W. took up the boats

Monday 17 of Aug

Shore 24 hours commences with strong winds from the W. steering to the W. at 6 p.m. saw a schooner steering to the E. latter part some foggy saw three sail standing to the S. no end

Tuesday 18 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the S. and foggy steering to the W. middle and latter part foggy

Wednesday 19 Shore 24 hours commences with light winds from the S. and a thick foggy middle part clear at day light steering of to the N. latter part fine saw nothing

Thursday 20 Shore 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the S. steering to the N.E. at 9 a.m. took in light sail middle part foggy steering a back latter part steering sharp by to the S.E.

Friday 21 Shore 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the E. with foggy at day light clear set sail and stood to the N.E. at 9 a.m. saw two right whales loared three boats and the waist boats boat steered starboard and missed one came on board and put the boat steerer forward and took a man by the name of Philip to steer the starboard boat and the starboard's boat steerer to steer the waist boat latter part rainy
