

Saturday²¹ of Aug 1868

Ship 24 hours commences with storm winds from the S.E. with rain first part took in light sail and doubled reefed the topsails and hauled the galls and fore sail and main sail standing on two masts tacks middle part thick and rainy latter part clear by spells winds

No Observation for eight days

Sunday²² Ship 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the S.E. at 2 p.m. saw a right whale loared and it came in foggy came on board at sun down took in sail some clear latter part a blowing strong

Lat 54.30 Long 168.10

Monday²³ Ship 24 hours commences with strong winds with rain winds from the S.E. at 4 p.m. winds hauled to the W and cleared at 7 p.m. spoke the French bark Norman clear latter part strong winds and rainy winds

Tuesday²⁴ Ship 24 hours commences with strong winds from the S.W. and foggy middle part clear latter part winds from the N is heading to the S.W. the Norman in sight so ends
Lat 57.20

Wednesday²⁵ of Aug

Ship 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N. a heading to the S.W. first part spoke the Eagle of New Bedford middle part fine latter part some foggy

Thursday²⁶ Ship 24 hours commences with moderate winds from the N.W. a heading to the S at 4 p.m. saw a right whale loared two boats and it proved to be a hump back came on board middle part winds hauled to the S. at day light steered of N.W. in company with the Norman and Eagle latter part saw St Georges island six ten miles

No Observation

Friday²⁷ Ship 24 hours commences with strong winds from the S a steering N.W. St Georges island in sight at 2 p.m. came in thick with rain shortened sail and hauled sharp by to the S at day light set all sail at 8 a.m. spoke the bark Norman of New Bedford latter part saw a right whale loared but with eight success came on board so ends

Saturday²⁸ Ship 24 hours commences with light winds from the N a steering down by St falls island six five miles saw several ships at day light steered of to the N.E. in company with the Norman
