

Sunday 30 of Aug 1868

Shine 24 hours commences with light winds from the N<sup>W</sup> & strong employed in bending a new fore sail and gill and topmast stay and at 4 pm the capt. went on board of the Norman at day light steered of to the N<sup>W</sup> at 4 pm saw whales loared three boats and the larboard boat struck at 11 took him a long side and got dinner

Lat 16° 4' 10" Long 57° 25'

Monday 31 Shine 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N<sup>W</sup> commenced to cut our whale took in the throat and one lip and was sharp to cut to the windward and the blanket piece tore off and gave it up it being ruff and blowing on. bent our starboard anchor chain on to other fluke chain and vered him ought at day light in moderate commenced to cut hooked on to the body and rolled it in lost the head on one lip latter part set some sail and stood to the N no ends

Lat 54° 40' Long 167° 50'

Tuesday 1 of Sept Shine 24 hours commences with strong winds and finally at 4 pm commenced to boil middle part moderate latter part calms sounds

Lat 54° 30' Long 167° 00'

Wednesday 2 of Sept 268

Shine 24 hours commences with strong winds from the N<sup>W</sup> employed in boiling middle part finished latter part saw whales loared and the larboard struck took him a long side and cut him in the Norman in sight no ends

Lat 54° 10' Long 167° 05'

Thurs day 3 Shine 24 hours first part finished cutting light winds from the N saw the Norman take a whale latter part saw whales loared and the larboard boat started and fired a gun in to him and the whale went of saw two sail

Lat 54° 40' Long 167° 10'

Fryday 4 Shine 24 hours light winds from the N<sup>W</sup> employed in boiling saw 1 whale loared four times during the day but with ought success

Lat 54° 20' Long 167° 50'

Saturday 5 Shine 24 hours commences with light winds from the N at 6 pm saw a whale a lying on the water which we thought was dead some four miles dist loared the larboard boat for him and when we got there he proved to be a lived whale struck him and killed him at 8 pm took him a long side and hooked on to him and he had a burn in to him at 12 finished latter part strong winds employed in stowing down our last whale no ends put a new boat on the larboard cranes
