

New Zealand Thursday November 16th 1837
first part a gale of wind to the Eastward
accompanied with heavy rain heading the South
middle and latter frequent showers but on
new foretopmast staysails sheets sails

Friday first part light air all round accompanied
17 with heavy showers of rain middle latter
clear but fresh breeze under double reef
sails. Lat 24:50. Long 171:13

Saturday first part a fresh ESE breeze. N
18 under double reef middle latter steering
N under double reef maintopail sails
Lat 25:45. Long 171:33

Sunday first part high wind E. Steaming. N
19 under double reef maintops and foresail middle
latter pleasant wind all sail sails. Lat 22:43
Long 170:38

Monday first part a fine breeze ESE steering
20 N under all sail middle latter course. N
employed in ship duty sails. Lat 22:01

Tuesday first part pleasant steering. N
21 N wind. N E employed in various jobs
middle latter course. N on board the
Mantopail and began to new maintop
sails. Lat 21:23. Long 171:20

Wednesday first part pleasant finished the
22 Mantopail and sent it with N E
course. N middle latter pleasant sails
Lat 22:23. Long 171:25

Thursday first part pleasant middle latter
23 calm employed in scraping the ship
all round in order to paint sails
Lat 21:58. Long

Friday first part pleasant and Steaming
24 N wind. N E finished cleaning
the ship middle latter rainey wind
all round the side. Breeze and all so
the ship house sails

Saturday November the 25th 1837
25 first part calm and rainey middle and
latter rainey until 3 o'clock when the wind settled
at SE blowing half a gale heading SE. sails
Sunday first part high wind SE heading. N
26 under double reef maintopail and foresail
middle steering SE latter. Lat 22:46
Long 175:50

Monday first part a fresh ESE breeze. N
27 N middle latter employed in floating the
sheathing from aft forward saw ashore at
distance. Lat 22:22. Long

Tuesday first part a fresh ESE breeze. N
28 N spoke the Mountovermore 25 mo
1700 lbs 6 months since she has got a
Whale Capt J. A Bunker apprehended
middle latter raised Eaze and cleared port
spoke the Johncogshell 25 mo 1400 lbs
and the Mountovermore sails

Wednesday first part ran down under the lee
29 of Eaze and spoke the Ann of Nantucket
44 mo 4000 lbs middle latter steering to the
Southward in company with the Ann sails
Eaze Lat 21:44. Long 174:55. Pylostachys

Thursday first part pleasant at 12 o'clock saw
30 Pylostachys and steared N by S until 4
o'clock when we spoke the Ann and halled
to the Southward middle latter slight breeze
at 11 o'clock 2 Boats went ashore and 2 from the
Ann sails

Friday December the 1st 1837
1 first part pleasant lying off and on at
the Island called Pylostachys at 4 o'clock the
Boats came off with about 4000 lbs of Potatoes
and few Turney apples and halled out to the
SE wind ESE middle and latter the same
