

Bartholme Sept 8th 1757

Let 3rd Mr Pughston is below again not able to stand his weight. Under close supervision of the said having a sail & being before the wind in my opinion we shall get a new moon where this season and it that the sea there is no question but what we are shall be obliged to come up here again in one month from this time on intending to make sail for Banrock island.

to make sail for Samoch island
June 6th Fla. Florida & Silver Cloud are no where to
be seen. It has moderated down the sun shines
out bright and warm. set, tips, gallantails, and
are still running before the wind to westward.
A school of Porpoises came under the bow fast-
to one of them by Frank but the iron drew
out and we did not get the fish

12. Heard under double reefed topsail for
since Sunday, it is now gradually cleared
so that we have shaken out the tops
and set top to allant sail and are
standing to Eastward & Southward.

stand to the eastward of the harbor.
The 11th Regt. of Portuguese raised a right-ribbed
ward away, the boat a heavy swell
on and down. Each got nothing but
a wet forepart for the sea & ground
mash over in the boat very few moments
merely drudging us. soon choosing this
weather since 10 am. gave up the chase
about 6 P.M. raised two sails. The
old man ran down to him. King George
to the James Murray & Bragance. The
Hormer too this season & the 13th

Bark Baltic Sept. 14th 1857

Oct 12th Wended with French Ship till we whalers since
we saw her last. Also damaged ship Brazilian
Sucker for lots of oil this season. saw plenty
of whalers to day but it was blowing too strong
to haul for them. I got some Paris Bay
Francisco papers and several books on board
of the U.S. I was there all the afternoon

Blowing a heavy gale of wind all sail tattered
in respect about 3000 men topside. 3 seasons
is staring us so strongly I think it very hard
but I can see no way of avoiding it
By old men will not give a man their discharge
but he can try make him away if they choose
when we get it spent each one of us has
nearly 200 dollars each in the ship. and if
we run away he gets that—

Bees having a heavy coat of winter since Sunday
the old men think of hait. For the island
in a few days. Our bees have happy to say
an also good and now we get soft shell very

Apr 17th
Anchored down short out the bay this morning
and are now standing along side the mill
with eight tons of oil on board. Banned a first
ship from the island 800 lbs. of oil. The second
no interest keeping company with her and a
sailing out through the passage together for
the dangerous shoals. This morning the third
sailed for the F.R. and all she has taken
is 1000 lbs of oil. we got a lot of molasses
on board of her, as ours is latent out.

They kept sand blowing strong
Commenced dragging out in the heavy fog for
some oil to fill our bell in the fore-castle
The bell man went on board of the gun boat
the morning at 5 am. and did not return
