

Port of Baltimore Oct 21st 1837

Dear Mother I have not as you
 precisely said anything since we have
 been laying in the Annapolis Bay. The time
 has passed off as usual in port
 we have been very busy discharging oil
 and making and sending up a new
 mainmast. Most all of the crew went
 ashore very early. Some came off as sailors
 usually. Mr. Sand others other hand stayed
 I met a friend on the Saratoga. I was with
 him part of my spare time. I received
 two letters from you and the same number
 from Silas which afforded me the greatest
 satisfaction. We are laying off and on at
 Annapolis the most beautiful of these islands.
 getting fruit. Sheep. Pottery and one fine
 Bullock. Besides some 20 head of domestic fowls
 I am sorry to say we are not much made. Mr
 Marshall of the mainmast is discharged and we
 have in his place a Mr. Reed a fine looking
 man. But as yet I have nothing of him. Our
 old blacksmith that came out from home
 with us. has also left us and is going home
 in the John Keralake. I am glad to think we
 are joined more at sea. For I am sick of
 the sight of these islands. I have the mainmast
 just come from shore for the last time with
 a boat load of oranges. and now we are
 bound straight for New Zealand to arrive
 for Richard Mays again. I commenced on Monday
 to write up the old mainmast accounts for
 him. and I shall not hurry the job at all
 I got a very good store of bottles from my
 friend Cyrus which is good. He makes I think
 altogether to expensive a place for a workshop
 to get in at particularly for those that wish
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Saturday Nov 13th 1837

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
