Remarks on Sunday May the 31st Day
This 24 hours fresh gales and foggy weather
saw nothing but phinbacks So Ends
Spoke the Ship Frederick Augustus from
Newport 21 knots out with 14 hundred net and 50
lbs of oil had some ships So Ends
