These 24 hours light trading and clear weather stirring close upon a wind with all sail out - saw the Bait

Monday 8 these 24 hours moderate trading stirring by the wind to the Southward

Sat p. Obz 13. 50 Long p. Chro 82. 47
Tuesday 9 these 24 hours brisk trading and cloudy weather stirring by the wind to the Eastward saw plenty of Black Fish Sat p. Obz 12. 14

Long p. Chro 81. 31
Wednesday 10 these 24 hours moderate trading and pleasant stirring by the wind to the Eastward saw a sail ahead

Sat p. Obz 12. 20. Long p. Obz 80. 20
Thursday 11 these 24 hours moderate trading and overcast weather stirring upon a wind to the South saw a ship in the South East

Sat p. Obz 12. 31. Long p. Chro 79. 43
Friday 12 these 24 hours moderate trading and overcast weather saw a sail. so easy

Sat p. Obz 12. 46. Long p. Chro 79. 29
Saturday 13 these 24 hours strong S. E. trade and heavy stirring by the wind to the Eastward all the canvas on the

Sat p. Obz 12. 8 Long p. Chro 78. 08
Sunday 14 these 24 hours fine clear weather strong winds from the South & S. E. stirring to the Eastward upon a wind at daylight saw the land off on the Bow and coming

Sat p. Obz 12. 14. Long 77. 18
Monday 15 these 24 hours commenced with fine winds from the S. W. at 1 P. M. saw San Lorenzo bearing E. N. E. 20 miles distant stood for it at 4 P. M. passed 14 miles distant at 6 P. M. came to anchor in the harbor of Callao later part all hands engaged packing ship Coopers gang setting up works for water

We found there much same sort of true Sargassum a French man of war Brig and a Peruvian ship of war commanded by French a British ship also the Rev. of St. Vincent's Bay. The m. from Home 100 bbls of Oil and quite a lot of true Clams - some later part sent down the four yards constant row it and sent it up again so easy
Tuesday 16 these 24 hours pleasant weather took off to 600 water lifted the ship to Port - 10

Wednesday 17 these 24 hours real Callao weather the Spanish water on liberty the Starboard water blacking away taking provisions on shore at 3 P. M. took on anchor and down ^{hooked} down the fore in consequence of the Chileans making this appearance off the harbor

Thursday 18 these 24 hours more Callao weather the Starboard water on liberty the fore water blacking away and so forth rummaging water
Friday 19 these 24 hours Callao weather again frogs and sandhills the Starboard water on liberty so easy these 24 hours

Saturday 20 these 24 hours strong water and getting off today. all hands on duty.

Sunday 21 these 24 hours fine weather the Starboard water on liberty George Hole ascended

Monday 22 these 24 hours all hands on board fitting for sea discharged a few English men and Portuguese took Joseph Chaplain and Benjamin Mother Ammearing to make their passage to the N. S. of America and to make the No. 100 as a passenger

Tuesday 23 commenced with light S. E. wind at 4 P. M. Capt. came on board took on anchor and stood on to sea at 5 P. M. spoke the N. S. ship of war Portsmouth bound into Callao at 6 P. M. saw San Lorenzo bore South 14 miles distant midship and later part came the Christian 29 ahead in sight Sat p. Obz 12. 14 Long p. Chro 77. 51
