Friday 8 of March 1841

First part strong N. N. W. wind at 3 P. M. took in M. & G. sails and double reefed the topsails at 6 close reefed the fore & M. topsails mialah close reefed the Main topsail and furled the topsail at 3 A. M. set the Main sail bar abating rather part mialah from m. made all sail

Saturday 9.

commenced with light mialah from N. N. and cloudy course S. E. & set the lower standing mialah part the same course S. E. by S. rather part strong mialah and thick overcast weather took in the lower & top of standing sails

First part strong mialah and cloudy course S. E. mialah part wind and weather much the same at 5 P. M. bore up S. E. with a mist wind everything set as usual

Edward M. Howland Master 1841

Sunday 11 of January 1841.

First part strong mialah from West and overcast weather course S. E. mialah part mialah increasing took stowing sails hauled up the topsails made every preparation for a Gale close reefed the fore & M. topsails rather part more moderate made all sail

Monday 12.

First part fresh mialah from N. N. W. course S. E. set the (M. & G.) Mast & M. & G. standing sails mialah squally took in the standing sails course N. E. by E. rather part light mialah and pleasant at 6 P. M. set standing sails below and aloft so easy

Tuesday 13

First part light mialah from West course East mialah part fresh mialah and squally took in standing sails and furled the Main sail rather part blowing heavy from S. N. hauled up the topsails and close reefed the fore topsails course N. E. by N. 3 Points Easterly Variation

At 7 P. M. saw the Seagoes Lat. 55.50 bearing N. W. by N. 20 miles Long by Chron. 64.22
