

Abstract, of A. Whaling Voyage

November, 1863

Strong Winds from the N and N.W. at 9. raised land at ten A.M. got a set of altitudes of the North Point of, Kisten, D. Achom bearing S. 45. E. miles from my Chronometer one 5. miles E the other 8. miles W. of the point went on shore to get potatoes, but got none got one goose. weather thick so ends this day

Monday, Nov. 2nd
Moderate gale from the N. ship on the Eastern track, rain and fog plenty, but no whales, all this day raining so ends this day

Tuesday, Nov. 3rd
Strong Winds, Ship steering E. and N.E. and South

Lat. 36.57 S.
Lon. 10.14 W.
Wednesday, Nov. 4 Strong winds from the N with rain squalls, saw a large ship steering in to the S.E. so ends

on board of Ship, R. Edwards. 1863

Thursday, Nov. 5.

strong winds from the S, W and N.W. ship of the Isle Austin at dark spoke the barque, sea Beuse of New Bedford so ends

Friday, Nov. 6 Ship run into a school of sperm whales at day light lowered for them from both ships, S.B. struck and was damaged, S.B. struck at 11. A.M. took him along side at 2 P.M. sea Beuse got on finish cutting at 11 P.M. so ends

Saturday Nov. 7th
Light S.W. winds ship steering in to the N.E. commenced to boil so ends this day

Sunday, 8 Nov.
Light winds from the W. and N.W. ship on different tracks took in sail at dark strong winds with rain through the night so ends this day
