Sat, Jan. 7th

First part fresh breezes from the N. and N.W. saw several B.W. lowered them at 6^h P.M. the S.B. struck whale and sounder, had at 9 P.M. line parted the waste Boat, struck the same whale, afterwards men dived at 11 P.M. so ends

Sunday, Jan. 10th

Baffling Winds and calms with thick fog and rain saw two right Whales toward shoals without success, as usual all night heavy rain. so ends the day



Monday, Jan. 11th

Strong Winds from the N.W. with rain and fog, at noon let up for a half hour saw two right whales did not lower, so ends



Tuesday, Jan. 12th All this day light and variable winds, some fog ship heading different courses, so ends
Lat. 37-55, Lon 18-54

Wednesday, Jan. 13th

Strong winds from the N. ship heading to the E. N.E. at 8 A.M. headed to the W. ward, at 4 P.M. a large ship, part heading to the S.E. took in sail at dark heading N.N.E. so ends
Lat. 37-54, W
at 8 A.M. Lon. 18-38 W

Thursday, 14th

Light baffling winds and calms, with rain, so ends

Friday, Jan. 15th

Light winds with rain and fog so ends

Saturday, Jan. 16th

Light winds with fog and rain ship heading S.W. at 2 P.M. let up, at 6 part the Barque, Blanders, took in sail at dark, so ends
Lat. 28-30, S.
Lon. 18-05, W.
by box altitudes

Sunday, Jan. 17th

Fresh breezes from the N.W. at 12 h. saw a dead whale, on ground, ship on different tack, so ends
Lat 39-30 S
Lon 18-08, W
