


Abstract of a Whaling Voyage in the
 Monday, Jan. 18. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 Moderate winds from
 the N.W. and S.W. ship steering
 different courses at 7 P.M. spoke
 and gamed with the ship of Captain
 Galeon, Capt. Slander so ends this
 day.

Tuesday Jan. 19. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 Fresh part strong
 breezes from the S. latter part
 moderate, all hand employed in
 mending sail B. Hakon in sight
 ship steering East, so ends
 Sat, 37-33, S
 Sun, 19-26, W.

Wednesday, Jan. 20. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 Fresh breezes from
 the S steering E.S.E. latter part
 moderate, so ends this day
 Sat, 36-52, S
 Sun, 16-06, W.

Thursday, Jan. 21. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 Fresh part
 moderate breezes from the S, S.W.
 steering E.S.E. sun plenty
 of fireback, at 5 P.M. raised
 the Sol. of Martin Seacuna.
 bearing S.E. by E. dis. 90, m,
 at dark took in sail, Inaccessable
 Sol bearing S.E. by E. true dis. 18, m
 Ship heading S. ^{at 3.6.49}
^{at 4.1.29}

Ship Robert Edwards of New Bedford
 Friday, Jan. 22. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 Light breeze from the
 S.W. at 6 A.M. raised two
 sperm whales, at 7, lured 4 boats
 the whaler about 2 mile apart
 two boats to each whale, 12, B, B,
 struck A, B, struck second boat
 the whale sounded and took both
 lines, at 2, Starboard, and Waste
 boat came down at 4, C, B, struck
 and killed the whale with burn
 lance, took him along side at dark
 and stood off shore, Inaccessable
 bearing S.E. by E. dis. 15, m
 so ends this day
 Raised by Joseph, Cannon.

Saturday Jan. 23. ¹⁸⁴⁴
 at 6 hooked on, wind
 fresh and baffling at 8, raised
 a school of sperm whales, got in the
 ship wake, and galled lured two
 boats without success, at 9, began
 to rain, breeze low, wind fresh
 from all points of the compass, with
 torrents of rain, and a heavy sea on,
 took blubber hook, belly chain and
 the J. boat, that fastened the ~~stop~~
 chain to the ship finish cutting at
 9, A.M. and set the Watcher
 so ends.
