land in sight. S. ends.

Thursday Feb. 4th

Thirst light winds
from the N. W. spoke the bark Jaleon
ship steering in for Tristan. At
at 1. P. M. went on shore and
got off some potatoes. bark Jaleon
getting nearer. S. ends this day

Friday Feb. 5. at 6. sent in two
boats with flour and took off
the remainder of the potatoes
36 bush. in all wind set in to
the N. E. with heavy rain
ship standing off to the N. W.
latter part wind howled N. W.
and down under inaccessible. At
sent in two boats. fishing blowing
quite fresh from N. E. S. W. boats come
on board S. ends.

moderate winds from
the N. W. ship on different tacks.
Jaleon, Bark in sight S. ends

Monday Feb. 8. light winds
from the N. W. at 6. A. M. raised
spinnaker lowered four boats
S. Boat went on and mist
S. B. struck. N. B. and B. B. S. B.
struck. Bow Boat cut line with secret
iron and three whales took them
to the ship, hooked on at 12. P. M.
finish cutting at 4. P. M. bark
Jaleon whaling to windward.
S. ends. Inaccessible isle
passing S. E. distant 15. m.

Tuesday Feb. 9. the

Strong Wind from
the N. commenced to boil
at 10 heavy rain and moderate
gale. let the fiers go out
took in fore sail and main
top sail. latter part wind hauled
to N. W. and died out rose ship
heading in N. W. by N. S. ends

strong winds from the
West. ship on different tacks
all hands employed in boiling
S. ends. boats in sight.
