Friday, Feb. 19. 1861

Light winds from the N.W. and clear weather, bearing E.N.E. 30 m. Incess, bearing S.E. dis. 15 m. took in sail, back flinders in sight, so ends this day

Saturday, Feb. 24. 1861

Light and variable winds with rain, the last few days, good weather, but saw no whales, nothing more worthy of remark, so ends

Sunday, Feb. 27. 1861

Moderate winds from the N. same in for. tizen, in the morning and got a raft of Walrus, about 100 lbs., back Talcen standing, of and on, with a boat on shore, seen nothing last two weeks, so ends

Monday, Feb. 28 to

Moderate winds with rain, put the ship in to the N.E. to take a look, then to New Holand land in sight bearing about S.E. W. Talcen, in sight so ends

Tuesday, Feb. 29. 1861

First part light winds from the W. with rain, steering N.E. latter part wind hauled to the S.W. steering E. so ends

Wednesday, Mar. 1. 1861

First part light winds from the S. and clear latter part moderate winds with rain, so ends ship by the wind heading E. and S.E.

Thursday, Mar. 2. 1861

Moderate winds from the S. ship under top sails heading E. S.E. so ends

Lat. 33-46, S.
Lon. 6-48, W.

Friday, Mar. 3. 1861

Light and baffling winds ship heading E. and S.E. so ends

Lat. 33-37, S.
