from the E, S. E. and S. E. ship on different tacks so ends

Son, 00-17. W

Monday Mar. 7th

Moderate winds
from the N. E. and N, steering
S. E. under all sail, so ends

Sat. 26-02. Cs

Tuesday Mar. 8th

Moderate winds
from the N, W, and S, W, with
some rain ship steering S. E. and
S. E. by S. so ends.

the S, S. W, and W, steering
S. E. so ends.

Sat. 37-53. Cs

Thursday Mar. 10th

first part light,
latter part moderate winds from

all hands employed in ship's
duty so ends.

Sat. 38-11. S.

Son, 13-23. E.

Friday Mar. 11th

Light winds from
the S. W, steering S. E. saw
a school of sperm grampuses so ends

Sat. 38-53. S, Son, 15-45. E.

Saturday Mar. 12th

Light winds from
W, steering S. E. great quantity
of Whale Birds, so ends

Sat 39-06. S Son 17-30. E.
