Saturday, April, 16th,

Light winds from
the S.E. and E. ship on
different tacks, so ends.

Lat, $38^{\circ}50'$, S.

Long, $117^{\circ}37'$, E.

Sunday, April, 17.

Light winds from
E. and S.E. ship on different tacks
shortened sail at dark, so ends.

Monday, April, 18th

Light winds from
the E. and S.E. ship on different
tacks shortened sail at dark, so ends.

Lat $35^{\circ}25'$, S.

Long, $117^{\circ}56'$, E.

Tuesday, April, 19th

Light winds from
S. and S.W. sighted Ball head
at 11. M. S.M. Ball head
bearing N. dir. to m. and in the long
 $118^{\circ}02'$, E. Took several observations, found
the long by Chs. to be
 $118^{\circ}33'$, E. This being an error of
 $66^{\circ}03' = 31'$, or two minutes, four seconds, of time
I rited the Chs. by the Long of B. head
and hauled the ship in to the S.E.
so ends.

April, 20th

Moderate winds and
squalley weather ship on different
tacks shortened sail at dark
so ends.

Wednesday, April, 21st.

Moderate winds from
S. and S.W. and squalley
weather, all hands employed
in setting up sharks for mutton
so ends.

Lat, $35^{\circ}16'$, S.

Long, $119^{\circ}45'$, E.

Thursday, April, 22nd

Light winds from
the S. and S.W. and
squalley, ship heading S.W.
so ends.

Lat, $35^{\circ}34'$, S.

Saturday, April, 23rd

Light winds
from the S. ship on differ-
ent tack one sail in sight saw a
school of cow fish, land in sight
so ends.

Sunday, April 24th

Light winds from
E. and S.E. Spoke, and loaded the
Bisque, Cecilia, of London from Otago bound
to Port. Agall, Ball head bearing S.W.
