

Abstract of a Whaling Voyage in the
July 2nd Saturday

Light and moderate

Winds from N. ship on different tacks
all hands employed in boiling, so ends

July, Sunday 3rd

Strong winds from N.W.
with heavy squalls, barometer low
broke out to sea down, finish boiling at
9. A.M. latter part moderate gales.
finish stowing down at 7. P.M.
all hands employed, ship heading
S.W. under main spruce and main
stay sail so ends

Monday July 4th

Gales from W. with
a heavy sea, at 9. P.M. set
close reef fore and main topsail
latter part, moderate set fore
sail, all hands employed in mending
ship, so ends, this day.

Tuesday, July 5th

Moderate winds from
the S.W. steering N.W. at
1. P.M. sighted land, saw several
fin backs, all hands employed in
mending sail, so ends

Lat, 34-39, S. at 12.

Ship, Robert, Edmunds New Bedford 1869

Wednesday, July 6th

First part strong
winds from S.W. steering E.S.E. and
E.N.E. at 1. P.M. wind hauled to the
S. and blew strong ship working off
shore under two reef topsails, and fore
sail. West Cape, How, bearing N.
Dis. 10. N. 50. Ends this day.

Thursday, July 7th

Moderate winds from the
W. steering E. and N.E. saw plenty
of fin backs, and hump backs, saw a
sterned, shifted the main topsail and
broke in sail at dark so ends
lull head in sight bearing N. 10. N. 25

Friday July 8th

Strong Winds from
W. N. W. latter part moderate
gales took in fore and inner
top sails, and fore sail ship
heading S.W. so ends

Lat, 25-35, S.

Saturday July 9th

Strong winds from
the W. N. W. ship heading on differ-
ent tacks close reef topsails so ends.

Lat, 36-20, N.
Long 117-27. E.
