

Abstract of a Whaling Voyage in

Sunday, July, 10th

Strong breeze from the N. ship E.N.E. saw plenty of humpbacks, saw a ship going in to the sound, ball head bearing N. by E. so ends

Lat, 35.17, S

Monday July, 11th

Moderate breeze from N.W. ship different courses saw great quantities of humpbacks shortened sail at dusk, heading to the N. ball Isb. bearing N.W. so ends

Tuesday, July, 12th

Strong Winds, and rain from the N. west the ship, at 10. wind hauled to the N. and increased to a moderate gale took in fore and mizzen to sails, and fore sail close reefed the main so ends.

Wednesday, 13th

Strong winds from N. and N.W. and squally ship on Heiden tack, under two reef top sails, all hands employed in mending sail, wore ship at dusk and shortened sail, ball Isb. in sight bearing N. so ends this day, Lat at noon 35.25

Strong winds from N.W. and N. ship on different tacks so ends

Strong winds from

N.W. and N. ship on different tacks, so ends

at 3 P.M. Sat, 35.29, S.

Saturday, July, 16th

Light airs and calm at 1 P.M. Light wind from E. steering N.W. Took in sail at dusk. Ball Isb. bearing N.W. about 20 m. so ends

at 4 P.M. Sat, 35.06

Lon. 118.30

Sunday July, 17th

Strong Winds from N.E. Stearing N. got a set of altitudes at 10 A.M. ball head bearing N. 14 m. found one of my chronometers 40 out the other right, at dusk took in sail so ends at 10 P.M. Sat, 35.22, S.
Lon. 118.02, E.
