Monday, July, 13th

Moderate winds from the W. with rain, and low Barom, p.m. Barom. still falling, so. Ends

Tuesday, Jan, 19th

First part moderate gales with rain, latter part strong winds made sail on ship, steering N. at dusk shortened sail, so. Ends

Sat. 36.18, S

Wednesday, July, 20th

First part moderate gales from W. ship on southern tack, latter part the same so. Ends, Sat, 36.28, S

Thursday, July, 21st

Strong winds from N.W. and W. with heavy squalls, burst the main top sail put James Tritimmon in irons for miss conduct, abusive language to the second mate, ship on different tacks so. Ends this day,

Sat, 36.20-S,

Friday, July, 22nd

Moderate gales from W. and N.W. ship on different tacks, all hands employed in mending sail, so. Ends, Sat, 36.01, S,

Saturday, July, 23rd

Gale from N.W. and W. ship on southern tack, blow away main spence, so. Ends

Sunday, July, 24th

Gale from W. ship on southern Tack stord in gang way board, so. Ends

Monday, July, 25th

Moderate winds from N.W. and squally, bent a new main top sail, and main spence took in sail at dusk, land in sight so. Ends

Sat, 35.22, S,

Tuesday, July, 26th

Moderate gales from N. ship heading W. all hands employed in mending sail, so. Ends this day, Sat, 35.31, S,

Wednesday, July, 27th

Strong winds from W. ship steering N.E. all hands employed in mending sail, so. Ends

Thursday, July, 28th

Strong winds from W. steering E.S.E. all hands employed in mending sail, so. Ends Sat, 35.42 Jan 120.54
