

Abstract of A. Whaling Voyage on
Aug. 5. continued,

for I could not take them both at once, took the other one to the ship, and had neither chain nor horse to put on him, had to get up a cable and while getting it on in the dark parted the line to the whale, and lost him, split the fore top sail so that could not hang up and it being too rough for a boat to lay to the whale, we were obliged to give it up, only two, 90. lbs. whales lost by not having fluke chains. I have 3, old condemned top sail sheets, for fluke chains, and one belly chain that is lost, Tenbyrigh, half a seasons work, 900, by sending out with trash.

first part moderate gales from N. ship heading on different tack. Part weather moderated ship steering courses, saw sperm whales this morning at day light going quick to N.E.

moderate winds from N.N.W. ship on different tack, shoten sail at dark. so ends

Strong westerly winds and squally ship steering different courses hunting for whales dead or alive, with out success. Took in sail at dark ship heading S.

at 3. Pm Sat. 34-45.3
Sun. 124-50.6

Tuesday, Aug. 9. th

moderate winds and squally ship steering different courses hands employed in mending sail so ends. took in sail at dark.

at 3. Pm Sat. 34-39.0
Sun. 124-81.6

Wednesday, Aug. 10. th

moderate winds from S.E. and E. ship steering different courses, so ends

at 4. Pm Sat 34-40.5
Sun. 124-28.6
