

Abstract of a Whaling Voyage on board of
Monday, Aug. 29. th

Moderate winds from
W. S. W. ship on different tacks
took in sail at dusk, S. C. Isl. bearing
S. W. by W. dist. 25. m. - so ends,
ship heading S. C. by S.

Tuesday, Aug. 30. th
Light baffling
winds and calm. S. C. I. in sight
took in sail at dusk, S. O. ends

Wednesday, Aug. 31. th
¹²⁵ ^{7th Sunday, M. Commences,} commenced with
moderate winds from the E. N. E.
at 9. a. m. raised a sperm whale
to windward made all sail and worked
the ship up at 1. p. m. lowered 3. last
boats at 2. p. m. S. B. struck at 3.
S. B. lowered at 4. struck second boat
took the whale to the ship at 5. put
the cable on for fluke chain. Took in
all sail. ship steering off S. S. W. under
bare poles, so ends

Sat. 34=44, S
S. C. bearing N. W. by W. dist about 30. ^m

Thursday, Sept. 1. st Strong breeze
from the Canal, N. E. at 6. a. m. began
to cut. Stole the hawk, ship layed back
-cept off before the wind got the backing
in at 12. p. m. being to rough let the
hawk lay, so ends.

Friday, Sept. 2. nd

Strong winds from
E and N. E. fire cutting and chased up
cleeks, and started work, so ends

Saturday, Sept. 3. rd
Gales from the N. W.
and W. all hands employed in
boiling, cool down at 5. p. m. and
turned up boats, so ends
Sat. 36=13. S.

Sunday, Sept. 4. th
Gale moderated
at 8. a. m. started work again and
rose ship heading N. W. Wind
W. S. W. so ends
Sat. 36=30. S.

Monday, Sept. 5. th
Light Winds from
W. ship heading N. W. W. More ship
at dusk, all hands employed in
boiling, so ends.

at 4. p. m. Sat. 35=39. S
Sun. 124=13. 6.

Tuesday, Sept. 6. th
Light wind, and calm
broke out to stem down, finish boiling at 11.
a. m. finish stowing down at 7. p. m. 105.
in all so ends, Sat. 35=43. S.
