S. S. E. ship heading S. W. saw one fin back, so ends

the S. ship on Eastern tack so ends

Friday Dec. 23rd

Light and baffling winds

at 8. p.m. Rained a right whale appeared at home, lowered without success saw two fin backs in Sat. 44-30, C. and, low 157-26, C. saw several sulphur bottoms, and Right whale porpoises, so ends

Son. 160-50, C.

Saturday, Dec. 24th

Moderate winds from

N. N. W. ship on different tack saw right whale, lowered without success so ends

Sat. 47-04, C.

Son. 160-48, C.

Sunday Dec. 25th

Moderate winds from

N. ship on different tack at 8. h. A.m. saw a right whale lowered 3. boats S. B. struck, took the whale to ship at 11. h. finish cutting at 4. p.m. and made sail, at 8. h. m. began to hoist, shortened sail, so ends.

Monday Dec. 26th

Moderate winds from

N. N. W. ship on different tack at 8. A.m. lowered for a right whale, without success, latter part wind light, all hands employed in hoisting shorten sail at dark, so ends.
