

Abstract of the Whaling Voyage in
Tuesday Feb 7th

Gale from the N.
with heavy sea ship heading
N. by N. W. W. under close reefed main
top sail and stay sail. Whale veered
off to seaward, and but little
chance to save him. at 4 p.m.
turned up Bow. 3. Whist Boats
so ends.

Sat. 47-45 CS.
Sun. 165-06. E.

Wednesday Feb 8th

First part Gale
from the N. W. W. ship on
Western tack at 12 m. wind
moderated at 2 m. wind N. with
a heavy swell from the N. heeled
the whale to the ship and hooked
on to cut. blanket piece tore off
could not cut, the whale being
back cut off the flock, and let
him go adrift at 11 A.M.
so ends.

Sat 48-28 CS
Sun 164-48 E

Thursday Feb 9th

moderate winds from
the CS. W. steering N. N. E.
took in the Bow Boat to repair
got stove in the last gale, sent
in the jib. Repaired it and bent
it. so ends. Sat. 48-20 Sun 163-47

Friday Feb 10th

gale from the
N. W. with some rain all hands
employed in mending sails, and
boot. ship on different tacks
sneers in sight bearing S.
at dark dis. 30 m. so ends
at 6 P.M. Sat. 47-34. S
Sun. 166-16 E.

Saturday Feb 11th

moderate gale from the
W. with rain at 8 A.M. saw no
change of weather, put off
for Bonaville, island to look for
Right whales. Sea watches.
Ship steering East so ends

Sunday Feb 12th

Strong winds from N. S. W.
steering E. by N. so ends

at 5 p.m. Sat. 47-52 CS.
Sun. 173-12 E.

Monday Feb 13th

Strong Winds from
the W. ship steering N. E. at
dark shortened sail so ends

at 4 p.m. Sat. 47-16 CS.
Sun. 176-22 E.
