Wednesday Oct. 25th

Moderate winds from
S. S. E. ship on different tacks
saw a right whale going quick
to the S. E. so ends.
Sat. 39-08.
Sun. 156-00.

Monday Oct. 30th

Light winds from
N. N. W. at 10. a.m. raised sperm
whales going in S. N. E. Found
3 boats at 2 p.m. S. B.
struck a large sperm whale. iron
drawed, chased him in S. E. until
dark with out success at dark
boats struck came on board, up to
the ship off S. E. so ends.
Sat. 40-58.5
Sun. 154-13.6.

Tuesday Oct. 31st

Moderate winds from N. N. W.
ship on different tacks, weather
By thick and foggy hazy at
5 p.m. Found 3 boats, for a large
sperm whale. S. B. struck. whale sounded
heavy B. B. struck second
boat and drawed, whale
sounded out two boats lines. B.
at part of the third at dark
iron broke, boats came on board
shorten sail, so ends. Sat. 41-06
Sun by a. c. 154-210

Moderate winds from
N. N. W. thick fog, plenty of fin-
backs in sight, so ends

Thursday Nov. 2nd

Strong winds from
N. weather thick and hazy ship
on different tacks, at dark shorten
sail, so ends

Wednesday Nov. 3rd

Moderate winds from
N. E. with hazy weather steering
different courses, at dark short-
ten sail, saw great quantities
of R. W. porpoises took 3.
shorten sail so ends
Sat. 40-30
Sun. 154-20

Thursday Nov. 4th

Moderate winds
from the S. W. S. N. N. W.
Ship on different courses
at sunset saw two sperm
whales heading in to the
S. E. by E. shorten sail, laid
main yard aback heading
S. W. — these whales raised
by Samuel Sheppard
