from the S.E. to S and N.W. with all Sail Set a Steaming

from the S.W. a Steaming S.E. by E with all Sail Set and
at 5 P.M. took in the fore topgallant Sail and the
main and put 2 reefs in the main topgallant Sail of
38-48 and Long 19-50 East

Remarks Wednesday 28th of June Am. 1848
This 24 hours begins with Strong winds from the N.W. with
Strong Squalls a Steaming S.E. and S.W. and from that
to E.S.E. with all Sail Set that is of every good a
running off before the wind and sea at 6 A.M. saw a
Sail a head the same and that was in sight yesterday
and the day before and saw four buckets at the Gun
tine employed in ordinary duties picking oakum
80 Ds End this 24 hours in the Lat 39-02 and Long by
chron 52-46 East

Remarks Thursday 29th of June Am. 1848
This 24 hours begins with Strong winds from the N.E. and
from that to S.W. with fog and rain all day employed
in ordinary duties saw nothing at 5 A.M. Set off Sail
with it a blowing Strong from the S.W. a Steaming
E.S.E. to End this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 38-06 and
Long by chron East from Greenwich in England
101 Ds

Remarks Friday 30th of June Am. 1848
This 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the S.W.
with it thick at 6 A.M. Set all Sail with the Winds
light a Steaming at around the compass from E.S.E.
to E.S.E. and at 10 took a Ship a Steaming S.W. with
the winds light but cold at 10 A.M. saw a Sail to the
windward a Steaming the same way that we were
employed in ordinary duties on duty saw a fire back
at 5 P.M. and at 1 P.M. set out the main
copper mast and began to put it to bind up
and at 2 P.M. Set the main topgallant rigging

Remarks Sunday July 2nd Am. 1848
This 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the
N.W. a Steaming to the E by S with the fore
topmast studding sail Set a running off before
the wind and at 3 P.M. saw a Sail a Steaming
about 5 E.S.E. employed in ordinary duties
at 5 P.M. saw something blows or short
that they did but no coldent see again after
the first time to End this 24 hours in the Lat
by obs 37-23 S and Long by chron 31-15 East

Remarks Monday 3rd of July 1848
This 24 hours begins with moderate winds
and calm the winds baffling all around the
compass and same of the time also employed
in fitting the royal rigging and painting the
waist Boat and getting redy for whaling saw
five buckets the wind light and baffling 80 Ds
End this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 39-02 S
and Long by chron 33-25 East from Greenwich
in England
