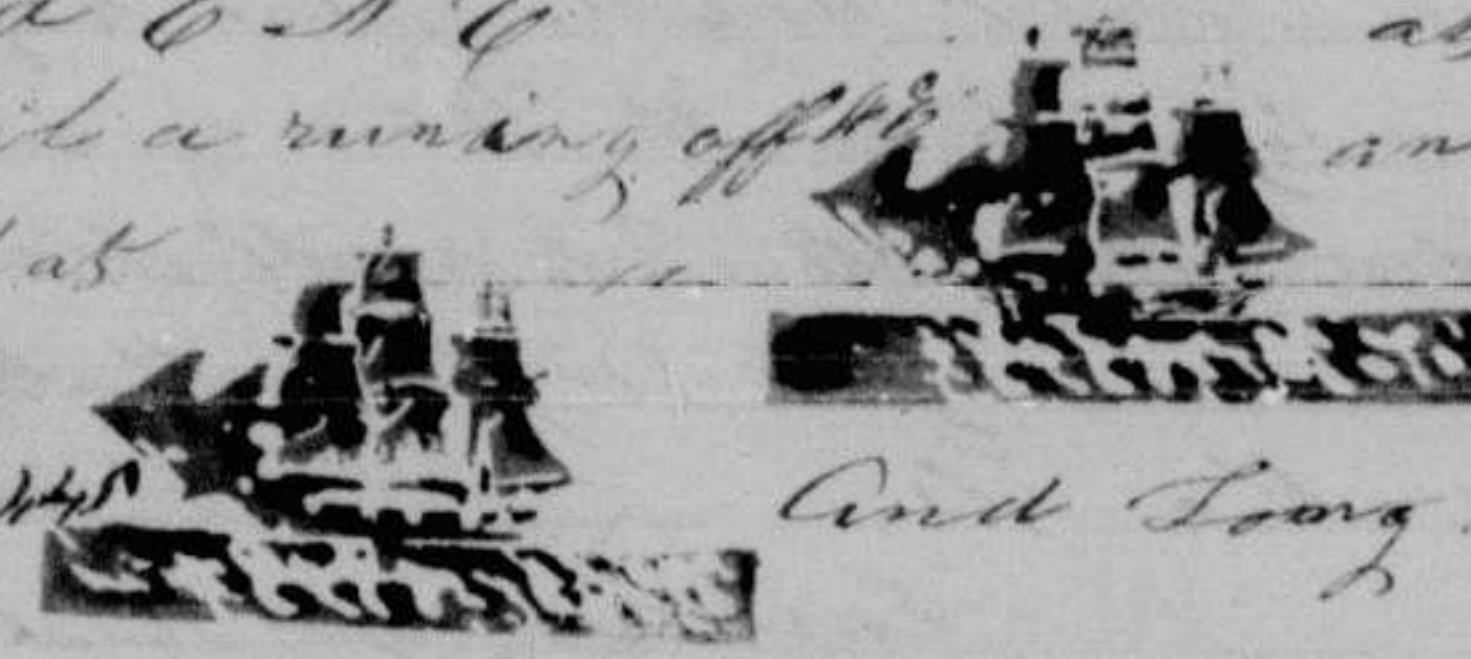


Ship's Log of New York 1848

Remarks Monday 21st of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the S and S.W. with it is cloudy all day employed in ordinary duty.
 at 4 P.M. Gave a Sail and saw five birds 2 or 3 times in the course of the day a steering off all day to the N.E. and E. N.E. at 6 P.M.
 Shortened Sail a running off and at 9 P.M. took on the wind and at 10 P.M. set off again
 To End this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 16-45 And Long 22-46 E.

Remarks Tuesday 22nd of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the S and S.E. with it pleasant all day employed in ordinary duty at 6 A.M. Set Sail a steering N.E. at 8 P.M. took in the fore and main topsails employed in filling the rigging saw nothing to end with short sail on the ship at 9 P.M. took in the fore and main topsails and at 11 took in the gaff and main topsails to end in the Lat 14-20 S and Long 14-20 East
 127 P.B.

Remarks Wednesday 23rd of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with strong winds from the S.E. and E.S.E. a steering E and by 11 from that to N.E. at 6 A.M. Set the topsail and at 10 put one reef in the fore and main topsails employed in filling the rigging saw nothing to end with short sail on the ship at 9 P.M. took in the fore and main topsails and at 11 took in the gaff and main topsails to end in the Lat 14-20 S and Long 14-20 East
 128 P.B.

Remarks Thursday 24th of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with strong winds from the S.E. and E.S.E. a steering E.N.E. with short sail 2 reefs in the topsails a blowing strong at 1 P.M. Gave 2 reefs and at 4 got in with in 25 or 30 miles of one and at 6 Shortened Sail and at 9 Gave 2 or 3 reefs in the sail to end this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 13-20 S and Long by Chron 44-45 East from G.

Remarks Friday 25th of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with light winds from the S.E. and S.W. all day a steering off N.E. a running down between the island and one can end and some humpbacks and some 3rd employed in ordinary duty. Took out 2 small pieces of beef and pork the sails light all day to end this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 13-20 S and Long by Chron 44-45 East from G.
 130 P.B.

Remarks Saturday 26th of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with light winds from the S.E. with it pleasant but cloudy at 1 A.M. Set all sail a steering E from that to N.E. with 3 reef in the fore and main topsails employed in ordinary duty a running the land down saw nothing at 6 P.M. took in some of the sails but at 2 P.M. we had run down off of the town and saw some 3 or 4 ships or vessels of some kind in port but we were ship and stood off shore again at 9 saw 5 or 6 first or there to end this 24 hours in the Lat 12-00 and Long East

Remarks Sunday 27th of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with light breezes from the S.W. employed in ordinary duty saw humpbacks and saw the land about 15 or 20 miles off all day a getting off shore a steering off shore about 6 P.M. to end this 24 hours in the Lat by obs 11-38 S and Long by Chron 44-45 East
 132 P.B.

Remarks Monday 28th of July 1848
 This 24 hours begins with light easterly winds from the S.W. and S.E. the latter part calm with the sail in the fore and main topsails employed in mending. Took at 5 A.M. on bent the fore and main topsails and bent it again saw 2 or 3 humpbacks and the vessel of some kind about 30 miles off to end this 24 hours with it calm the mast of the line and when it is calm the winds is so light that we doubt you a head end 3 or 4 miles in sight in the Lat by obs 11-38 South and Long by Chron 44-29 East from Greenwich in England
