

From Havana for New Orleans.

Thursday March 22nd 1832 Commences fine weather and gentle breeze from N.E. At 8 A.M. hove the anchor up and made all sail for the N.W. Pass. At 11 A.M. anchored in 7 fathoms the New Light House beeing at the mouth, bearing North 3 miles distant. Latter part of the day calm. In the afternoon went on board Ship Ganges of Dutchport (Me) Capt. Snow, who arrived last night 40 days from Havre.

Friday March 23rd Commences calm. At 8 A.M. the Stearn Boat Pocahontas came down with Bings Samuel & John of Boston and Aquila of Portsmouth. After bringing them over the bar, she took on the Ship Augusta of Boston & ret^d and took the Palma the Sch^r Eagle of Portland and a Mexican Schooner. At 12 past 10 A.M. having the afore^s mentioned vessels in the Ship & Sch^r Eagle lashed each side and the Sch^r & the Mexican in tow proceeded under all steam at the Mississippi for New Orleans. At 11 A.M. discharged the Pilot. Same time the Revenue boat boarded us and examined Manifest &c. At 1 P.M. being moderate breeze from E.S.E. the 4 vessels set all drawing sails. Continuing light breeze, being lowered at the rate of 4 to 5 knots by the land, by Steam. The Capt. of Sch^r Eagle and a young man by the name of Townsend of Boston Supercargo of the Ship dropped astern from the Sch^r with her boat and came on board being too dangerous to return remained on board the night.

Saturday March 24th. First part light air and calm and very much annoyed with Mosquitoes & Sand Flies in abundance. At 8 A.M. off Grand Prairie. At Meridian off Abnstone's Plantation and passed Ship Oceana of New York at lashed there.

Sunday March 25th Still on the bar. The Stearn boat until 11 A.M. when we were cast adrift and hauled in at the foot of Court Street wharf after finding that my brother William was in the place called upon him and also met with Mr. Josiah Swinton an old friend, who resides with Mr. John C. M^r Lewis another old friend.

At New Orleans.

Monday March 26th 1832. Morning took my things to the the levee kept by Mr. Thos. Caldwell City. Saw nothing worth of attention is on low land and consequently.

Tuesday March 27th. Off leisure and fair warm weather. Found me here, as also many other acquaintances I have fell in with in my travel.

Wednesday March 28th. Fair weather. Have made several applications, none that suits my expectations.

Thursday March 29th. Fair weather to be seen worthy of remarks, except which, I may say I never saw equal.

Friday March 30th. Fair weather upon any thing. Nothing offering to even for me to do for want of a.

Saturday March 31st. Nothing remarkable. Gentleman (passing) the time.

Sunday April 1st 1832. A fair difference in the bugle & noise.

Monday April 2nd. Fair weather. Capt. Currie who came out in Capt. Reed. I also saw yesterday Capt. Bath. Bishop of Providence who sailed the same day that I did from Newport, bound here in Ship Romulus Capt. Williams.

Tuesday April 3rd. Saw my Brother William this day, who thinks of returning home soon. Saw Capt. Downough of New London a fellow passenger from the Havana and went with him to his lodgings in the evening.

Wednesday April 4th. Equally weather with rain. Visited but little this day. Capt. Davis whom I came with from Havana requested me to go with him to Tabasco & from thence to New York but all I could receive would be to him.
